MARCH 25, 1955 STATE TAX PLANS

The house tax committee has great many plans. Nearly a sort of a tax has been suggested...

Unless the ways and means committee does much more cutting than it has — and it isn't — it will be necessary to raise more than \$60,000,000 in additional money for the state.

What will come out as means of raising that 60 million dollars is not very clear so far. The total, however, is so large that some things are sure to be tried.

Elimination of some of the exemptions in the corporation excise tax will raise a few dollars, maybe \$5,000,000 from utilities and downtown business property.

There are a few little taxes that can be increased, like insurance premium taxes, but they amount to little, when compared to the aching \$60,000,000.

That means that income taxes will be increased or a sales tax passed. Oregon already collects a large part of its taxes from the moderately well to do.

Politically they can cast most of the votes. For that reason they have been well protected. We think that protection will have to be curtailed despite the threats of the rabble-rousers who, from well carpeted offices, protect the populace for pay.

It is our opinion that Oregon needs investment in industry more than it needs additional workers. The legislature might consider that.

It is entirely possible that within a few months we can vote on a bigger income tax, a sales tax, a cigarette tax, several smaller taxes at Wasco.
