Mr. and Mrs. Arzell Lemley took their daughter, Carolyn back to Eugene Sunday to resume her studies at the university after spending spring vacation here.

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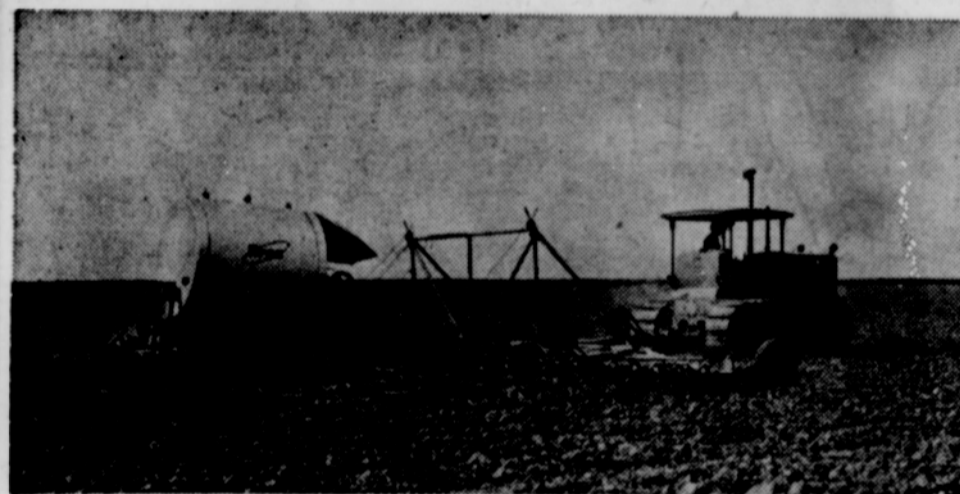

DID YOU KNOW THAT: (1) According to the California Bureau of Chemistry, California growers used more than three times as much aqua ammonia (20-0-0) the first 9 months of '54 compared to the same period of '53? 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Brea's Agricultural Technical service offers these recommendations for dryland grain: Vary the application rate with average rainfall expectancy as follows. In California: 8-12 inches of rain—30-40 lbs. N per acre; 12-18 inches of rain—40-50 lbs. N per acre; 18-24 inches

of rain—50-60 lbs. N per acre; and above 24 inches of rain—60-75 lbs. N per acre. In Washington and Oregon: 8-15 inches of rain—30-50 lbs. N per acre; 16-23 inches of rain—50-70 lbs. N per acre; above 23 inches of rain—70-90 lbs. N per acre. Soil tests are recommended to determine phosphate requirements.

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
