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The forty second annual Oregon Cattlemen's association convention will be held at Corvallis May 9-11. Folks planning on attending this convention should make their reservations through the chamber of commerce, Corvallis, as soon as possible.

The Sherman County Fair will be held at the Fairgrounds at Moro September 8-11. Folks should plan now towards exhibits, that will contribute towards an outstanding fair.

Close to half, 44 per cent of all the wheat produced in the U. S. last year, is placed on a government price support. Oregon's contribution to the total was 18 million bushels, that is only a drop in the bucket compared with the national production, but it represents 1/4 of all the 1954 crop grown in this state.

The Sherman county cattlemen own a squeeze chute that is for rent to any Sherman county folks that desire to handle their cattle. The chute can be secured through the county agent's office, Moro.

Stockmen who plan on handling their cattle are urged to arrange for Bang's testing during May and June. Dr. George Marugg, federal veterinarian is available as a public service for folks to utilize in the Bang's testing work. Arrangements for testing can be made through the county agent's office at the convenience of the operator. T. B. testing can be done if so desired.

Longevity tests with Aldrin and Dieldrin have shown that they continue to give nearly perfect control of wireworms and tuber flea beetles six years after the original application of 10 lbs of actual material per acre. These two materials, as well as DDT can be used by home gardeners where wireworms are a problem in potato or other type root crops.

An application of a quarter of a pound of Aldrin per thousand square feet would be similar to the 10 pounds per acre recommendations.
