WHEAT SUBSIDIES A reprint from the magazine "The New Leader" containing the Shinner idea of what to do about farm problems has arrived in the mail and while it contains some valuable charts (presumably correct) about the large percentage of farm supports that now go to big farmers it states a farm policy that would be worse. First assumption is that farmers will have to have a subsidy. That we do not believe. No individual or group having charge of a part of the public domain should need a subsidy. It may be necessary to help farmers—and we are thinking of wheat farmers—until the huge surpluses the support plan has built up, are dissipated. As a regular program farmers can get along better and with more long range price security on an open market than with a subsidy. The Shinner plan sounds like the old Farmers Union plan or the Brannan plan which would pay farmers a stated income. We do not believe that the government should hire itself a bunch of serfs. The question now before wheat farmers is the quota vote late in June. There is probably a better reason for voting for quotas now than ten years ago unless the government will promise to keep the surplus off the market. It will do that under the flexible support plan. It may not if quotas are defeated. The acreage has been set at 55,000,000 which is enough to produce all the wheat we need and more than we want. Better farming, better fertilizers, better weed killers, better weathers control has made it possible to raise sufficient wheat on 55,000,000 acres. The question to be decided about wheat is not only the number of acres but where those acres shall be. We think the man with land best adapted to wheat should grow that crop and men with land best adapted to corn or cotton or soybeans should grow that crop. If the government cannot develop such a program—and it would be extremely difficult—it should get out of the farm control program entirely and let the real wheat farmer compete for his market. We are sure he could so compete and successfully. We think this area would be better off on a long time basis of price instead of the basis of politics. We can never win our proper share of the market as long as politics controls. We do not have the representation nor the population to get it. In fact, the longer the farm problem remains in politics the less the big wheat farmer can expect from it. It will be the little farmers, the subsistence farmers, who will get the aid because there are more of them. One of the attractions of the two-price plan is that it permits some slackening of government controls by letting a good part of the crop go on the open market. It might lead to letting it all go on the general market. And that, we believe, is the only hope for the big wheat farmer.

CLEAN-UP DAY

The city dads of Moro have named a day for a general clean-up and citizens are expected to get out with shovel and fork and rid the city of the winter's accumulation of debris and junk. That is desirable and we hope for the day the good good support such days have so often received from Moro citizens. But even after the city is cleaned, after it has been shined and washed, it isn't going to be a very pretty unless something else is done to it. It needs painting. For long range improvement some fast growing trees could be planted along the southeast side of Main street to hide the piles of machinery, good and bad, that seem to accumulate on the city land below the park. A possibility would be to extend the park farther down the creek. Of course, the gravel that still covers the streets from the sanding operations of winter will be washed off, some trees will be trimmed and painted. But something more than a one day swish of the broom is going to be necessary to make the town as pretty as it could be.

County Ramblin's

Sherman county 4-H boys and girls submitted applications this week relative to attending the 1955 4-H club summer school, at Corvallis, which will be held June 14-24. Boys and girls need to be 12 years of age, as of January 1, 1955 to be eligible to attend, also to have completed one year of 4-H club work previous to this year. Club members attend 4-H summer school on the basis of scholarships which are presented by business and community groups and individuals. Total cost of the scholarships this year is \$25.00. Most scholarships are figured on the basis of \$20.00. Any one interested in making such presentations in sponsoring such scholarships are asked to contact the county agent's office. Ed McCause in Union county, under similar moisture conditions as here in Sherman county, has received wonderful returns from a grass and alfalfa and pasture. Mr. McCause has 90 acres of crested wheatgrass and alfalfa. Last year he purchased 300 head of 15 month old feeder steers and put them on this pasture June 26. He sold the steers on July 24 after a gain of 2.24 pounds per day. The gain of 2.24 pounds produced 212 pounds of beef per acre, and at 20 cents a pound this would be somewhere around \$40 per acre. Farmers that have received various weekly market information reviews from the Agricultural extension office, OSC, were sent a letter this week, relative to continuing of their previous request.
