MR. PRESIDENT

When a man gets to be president everyone feels that he has a right, or even a duty, to analyse his characteristics and expound thereon for the benefit of any one who will listen or read.

Some of it is a bit amusing and not very factual for the outs of ten find the president to be a very ordinary fellow at best and a disreputable scoundrel in most matters; the ins are inclined to praise him as a sort of perfect executive. That is just human nature expressing itself. Some like the Giants and some like the Bums.

President Eisenhower gives evidence of being a blend of conservative and radical that draws the loyalty of neither of the extremes. He has done much to restore private enterprise to the nation and would certainly prefer less government than more.

His proposals for a huge wad of money for road building and federal aid to schools were radical and would have materially changed the balance between federal and local governments in those matters. A rather conservative congress seems about to dispose of both proposals.

So many radicals ideas have become conservative and so many conservative ideas would appear radical to the coming generation such appellations must be used with care. Unemployment compensation was once a radical notion and now one is a conservative if he thinks private industry shouldn't pay it itself and all the time.

What is radical in one place may be conservative in another. Look at the farm program suggestions for proof of that.

So there is danger in classifying a man who represents so many millions of people as being motivated from one point of view or as always being on one side of the economic fence. The president is a man who can say "No", who is sincerely interested in doing his job as well as he can. We will let some one classify him in a 100 years from now and we won't even read that.

DO IT YOURSELF
A lot of fun is being made of the do it yourself frenzy which does have its funnier side. But there is a practical side to it, too. A generation ago no man was considered fit to become a householder without knowledge of how to repair the gadgets around the place. Then the gadgets multiplied until an expert's care seemed necessary and it is only recently that householders have been catching up with their once accepted duty.

Grandpa would mend a fence, milk a cow, harness a horse, set a tire and brace up a wobby wagon so it would run home. That was expected of him. There is no reason why grandson—who can do none of the above—shouldn't adjust to his environment so that he can repair a motor, spray the garden, wire the garage and paint the bathroom.

Gadgets got ahead of us; now we are catching up. And it isn't funny. It is necessary for solvency now as it was before.
