MAY NOT SO BAD

May was not the coldest May ever. It was the fourth coldest. The average mean temperature was 51.4, a good 3.6 below the 55 degrees that is normal. It was a little colder 51.3 in 1953, a lot colder in 1916 with 49.9 and colder than that yet in 1933 when it was 49.8.

Warmest day was the 19th when it was 80 and coldest was May 14 when it was 30, which was the last frost. Average date for last frost is May 10.

For precipitation the month brought .69 inch and that is .11 below the normal. For the crop year it now stands at 7.87 which is 2.55 below normal.

Local Residents Cause Most Wrecks

Local residents, not out-of-staters or strangers, contribute most to Oregon's traffic accident toll, a study of statewide accident records shows.

More than 90 per cent of the drivers involved in traffic mishaps last year lived within 25 miles of the scene of occurrence and about the same percentage held valid Oregon drivers licenses.

Although some 900,000 out-of-state cars probably will be driving Oregon streets and highways this year, the division said the tendency to blame tourists for a major share of vacation-season accidents is not consistent with the facts.

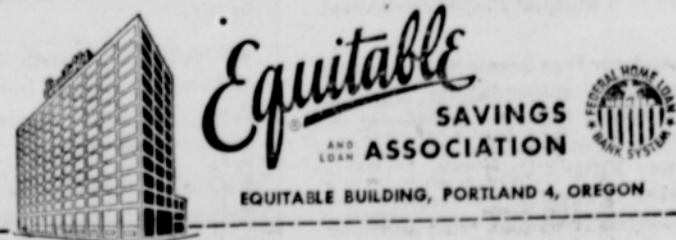
