### County Ramblin's

The symptoms were somewhat different from normal blackleg as determined by Dr. Homer Webb, veterinarian of The Dalles. Dr. L. R. Vawter, veterinarian in charge of the diagnostic laboratory at OSC was contacted and the unusual symptoms-spelled blackleg to Dr. Vawter. All calves and heifers and cows were re-vaccinated as protection against this very virulent disease.

Other farmers should take due notice of this early loss of calves to blackleg. Vaccination will need to be done prior to this time or when the calves are about three months of age. Calves that are under two months of age that are vaccinated should be re-vaccinated again for blackleg at weaning time according to Dr. L. R. Vawter. Any farm where blackleg has formerly occurred may be considered permanently infected and future outbreaks can be expected among young, unvaccinated cattle.

The 4-H summer school delegates returned from Corvallis last Friday, after a very educational and enjoyable ten day experience. Many of the older boys and girls gained considerable leadership experience. This year Susie Woods and Sherrie Fraser were presidents of their living groups. Tommy Higley served as sargeant of arms and Sharon Belshie as song leader of their respective living groups. One evening many of the 4-H clothing club members participated in the annual dress revue. Sherman county girls participating were Ronda and Sherrie, Fraser, Susan Woods and Mavis Miller.

Each evening during 4-H summer school special programs were held at the Coliseum on the campus. One such night was the dress revue mentioned above, and others include the radio revue, stunt

night, smokeless smoker, and others. One known as "International Night". I have asked Wilma Gentry to write something about her experiences and she has written on evening programs, specifically about the "4-H International Night". The following is by Wilma Gentry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Gentry, Moro.

"The 4-H International Night is one of the most impressive nights of all summer school. It starts with the girls' chorus singing the Song of Peace while the flags of all the different countries and nations are paraded in front of the audience. After the bearers and their flags are seated, the honored guests take their places. Jack Wells as the MC then introduced some of the honored guests. Glenn Klein was introduced as Oregon's first international farm youth exchange student. George Jefferson was introduced as a student IFYE to Uruguay. Then as Mr. Wells reads off the names of the countries and nations the respective flags are brought forward. Bill Abel, a student IFYE, who recently spoke to the high schools and the PTA of Moro, was introduced and told the group something about Argentina. Then Bill introduced a student from Argentina who is visiting the U. S. He then told us the history behind the flag of Argentina. Other IFYEs were Dorothy Teel, who had gone to Germany, and she did

the tango which is a typical dance in Germany as well as in Argentina. A student from Argentina was her partner. Four Burmese IFYEs talked to us about their country and then one of them did one of their typical dances."

The following are comments by Karen Wilson on her experiences at 4-H summer school.

"On Tuesday, June 14th, 20 students, both grade and high school left for Corvallis to attend ten days at 4-H summer school. For most of these students it was the first time, and for others it was either second or third. While at summer school I had the opportunity to play in the

4-H summer-school band, composed of 163 students and led by Ted Mesang, who had also composed the musical numbers played. This band played on the radio four times while we were there. Mr. Mesang was liked by all the students under him and he made it so that playing with him was enjoyable.

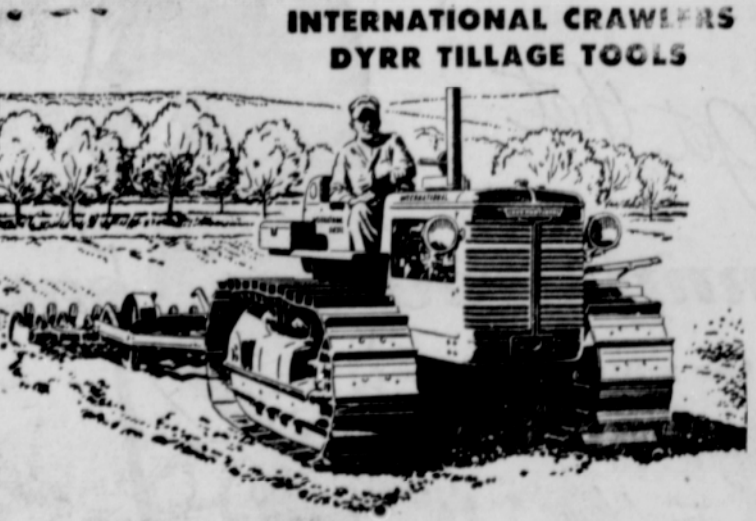
