Lt. Col. T. L. Fultz, acting superintendent of the Boys Industrial School of Lancaster, Ohio, announced the appointment of Duane C. Lemley, 25, as supervisor of the social service department.

Lemley has been active in correctional and youth work for the past five years, having started his career in this field as a social worker and psychologist at the Oregon state penitentiary, Salem, in 1950. From 1952 until 1953, he worked as a probation officer for the Cuyahoga county juvenile court in Cleveland and came to the school from the state department of public welfare, bureau of probation and parole, La Crosse, Wisconsin, where he had been employed as a probation and parole counselor.
