Safe-Teen Program Reduces Hazardous Teen-Age Driving

A sharp decrease in hazardous driving violations by Beaverton high school teenagers during the first six months of existence of Safe-Teens, teenage safe-driving

crusade, was announced this week. Judge Frances Cook, who presides over the Beaverton justice court and who founded Safe-Teens last December, said 22 Beaverton high students appeared before her on moving traffic violations during the first six months of 1954. Only seven, she said, have been on her docket during the same period this year.

The lady justice says she feels certain the willingness with which Beaverton teenage drivers have accepted Safe-Teen has made all high school drivers in the area safety conscious. Three of the seven who appeared before her were members of the movement and lost Safe-Teen membership for a probationary period. The judge estimates three-fourths of the 200-odd Beaverton high school students who drive to school have joined the plan which has enrolled more than 8000 young drivers all over the country.

BIG VOLUME OF MEAT PRODUCED DURING MAY

A total of 1,965 million pounds of red meat was produced by commercial livestock slaughtering plants during May. This was 1 per cent more than the 1,936 million pounds produced in April and 10 per cent more than the 1,792 million pounds produced in May 1954. Estimated meat production includes slaughter in federally inspected plants and other wholesale and retail plants, but excludes farm slaughter.

Meat production the first five months this year totaled 10,145 million pounds, 8 per cent above the 9,427 million pounds produced in the corresponding period last year.
