DRIVERS LOSE LICENSES
Oregon courts convicted 10,334 drivers of violating state traffic laws during July, Secretary of State Newby reported Friday. Convictions totalled 9,959 in the

same month last year.

Driving while intoxicated brought court-imposed penalties to 309 motorists including suspension of driver's licenses as required by Oregon law upon conviction of this offense.

Newby said 109 other drivers lost licenses, as recommended by the courts in which their cases were tried, for such charges as reckless driving showing too-frequent accidents or traffic law violations resulted in 54 suspensions during the month.

OIL COMPANY DRILLING
Standard Oil Company of California, which abandoned its first Oregon wildcat as a dry hole just a month ago, announced today that drilling of a second exploratory oil well in Oregon will begin within the next two weeks.

Location of the second well will be about 40 miles southeast of Prineville, in Crook county. It will be drilled to test geologic formation in that portion of central Oregon, where Standard holds a number of leases.

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
