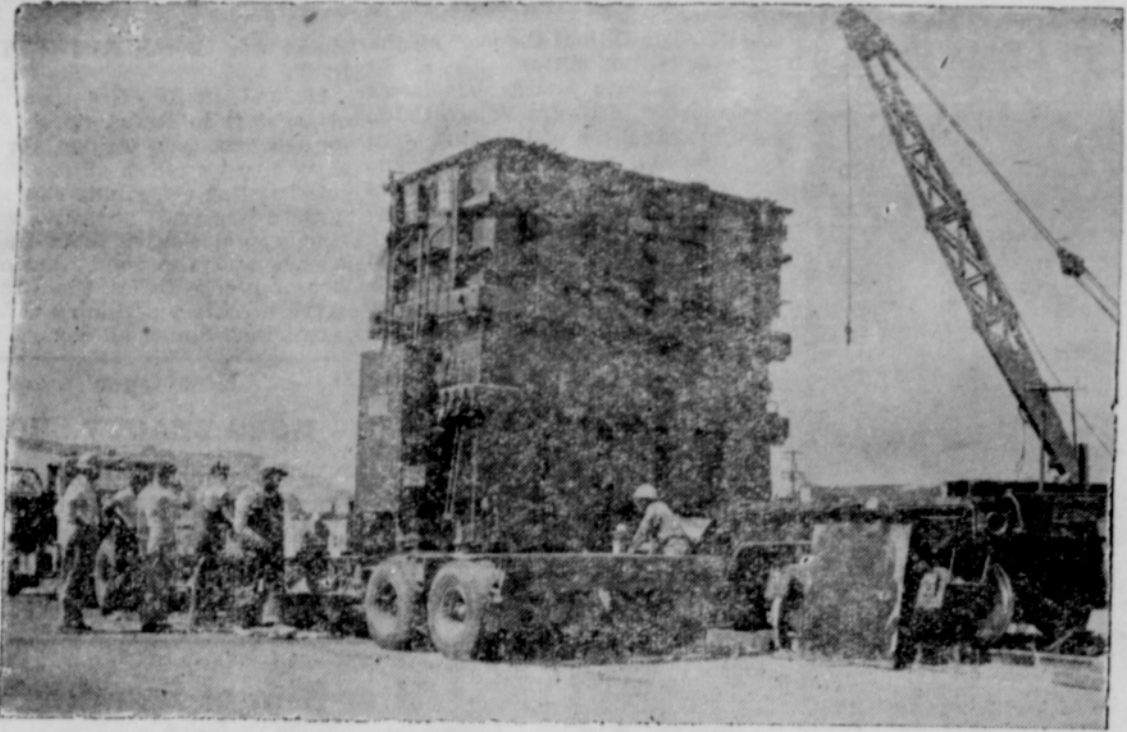




One of the largest transformers ever ordered by Pacific Power & Light company is shown shortly after it arrived in The Dalles last week on a specially designed flat-

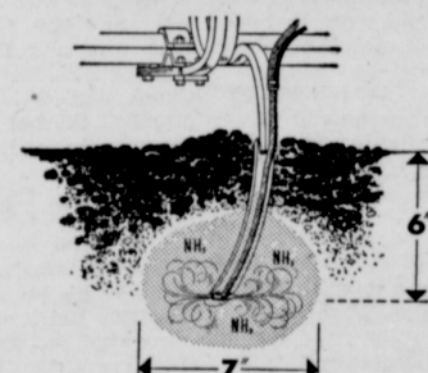

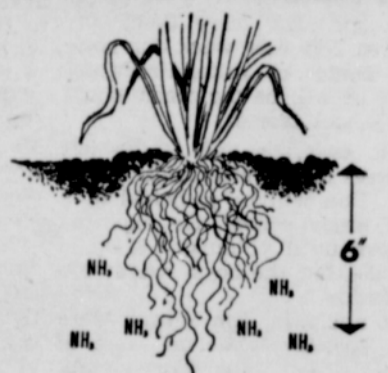

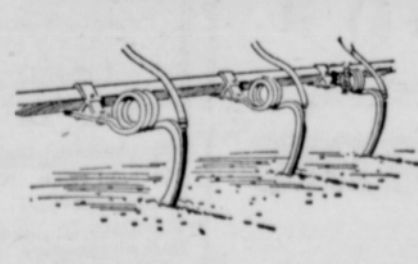
