County Ramblin's

The experience of Phil O'Meara Wasco, should encourage everyone planning to irrigate from wells to have the water sampled for harmful minerals prior to irrigating through a sprinkler system. Gale Holzaphel has had aluminum pipe deteriorate due to the impurities in the irrigation water at his project at Ordinance. A similar condition is being experienced by Phil O'Meara, Wasco, after one year of irrigation. Final analysis of the water has not been made at this time, but initial information indicates that the water is similar to analysis as that at Holzaphel's at Ordinance.

Small pitting is occurring in the O'Meara pipe which now must be treated with sulphuric acid and given a protective finish, to keep the aluminum from deteriorating. Those planning on a sprinkler irrigation system, using water from under ground sources, or from a spring, should take advantage of an analysis test through the soils department of Oregon State college.

Those string to have water analysis should contact this office for further information.

The September hunters report of Jim Jones shows that five coyotes, one bob cat, 2 badgers, 2 racoons and one skunk were killed during the month. Folks having predatory animal problems should contact Jim Jones at Grass Valley for assistance.

Information from the state ASC committee indicates that the 1955 ACP program will include cost sharing for practices performed on federally owned and non-crop land, for the benefit of adjacent

or nearby privately owned land. This would apply to persons renting Taylor grazing land, where improvements in water, forage and fencing might be accomplished. Farmers with Taylor grazing lands should give consideration to developments with the assistance from the ACP program this coming year.

Farmers wintering or fattening cattle this fall should use their pencil pretty close to determine the best values of feed on the market. When feeding an animal all feed stuffs are priced generally according to the digestibility of the nutrients in the feed. With alfalfa hay at \$20 a ton, like it was a year or so ago, a pound of total digestible nutrients in alfalfa cost around 2c per pound. At \$30 the digestible nutrients cost 3c per pound. By comparison barley at \$35 to \$40 per ton costs around 2½c per pound of digestible nutrients. Farmers who have not purchased alfalfa hay to feed, should consider feeding their own barley when other hay or chaff is available.

To date the USDA has said nothing regarding the support levels on 1956 barley or oats. Support levels for 1955 crop were announced last December.
