More Dry Land Grass Seed Needed

Each day things point towards increased demands for dry land grass and legume seeds. Many farm organizations and the department of agriculture are swinging towards the soil bank idea, of paying farmers to seed grass on diverted acres. Besides these seedings increased demand is being shown in sagebrush removal programs, where dry land grasses are needed.

Oregon farmers with crested wheatgrass or other dryland grasses might do well to consider fertilizing areas that could be harvested for seed this coming year. If a grass seeding diverted acres program is instituted a scramble for dryland grasses will exist.

Regrowth of trees and brush that have been cut can be prevented by spraying or painting the cut stump with 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T oil sprays. Suggested rate is one quart of the chemical containing active acid and eight gallons of diesel or stove oil. Where a hand sprayer is used one half pint of material to two gallons of oil is recommended. Stump treatment should be made immediately after cutting and sufficient spray should be applied to cover the sides of stump to the ground line. The same chemicals can be used on uncut trees or brush, trees or brush should be sprayed to at least two feet of the ground. Basal sprays work best on trees smaller than eight inches in diameter.
