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NEW ENGLAND BOILED DINNER



For a meal with old-fashioned flavor that's perfect for these cold, wintry days, serve a New England Boiled Dinner featuring corned beef, cabbage, carrots and potatoes.

Accompanied with other early American favorites—tangy beer, corn bread muffins and zesty mustard or horseradish sauce, it provides a meal that's perfect for informal supper parties as well as family meals.

NEW ENGLAND BOILED DINNER

- 3 to 4 pounds corned beef
- 4 peppercorns
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 6 small potatoes, peeled
- 6 carrots, scraped
- 1 small head cabbage

Place meat in large heavy kettle with enough water to cover. Add peppercorns, bay leaf and thyme. Bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook, covered, 3 to 3 1/2 hours, or until tender. Meanwhile, cut potatoes and carrots into halves or quarters, if large. Cut cabbage into 4 to 6 wedge-shaped sections. About 30 minutes before meat is done, add vegetables to meat stock and cook until tender. If necessary, lift meat from kettle to make room for vegetables, then place it on vegetables to keep warm while vegetables are cooking. To serve, lift meat from kettle and remove surface fat before transferring to a heated platter. Remove vegetables from stock with a slotted spoon and place around meat. Makes 6 generous servings.

Cheese Dishes Sound Tasty and Filling

Try these hearty, satisfying "budget stretchers" for some mighty good eating!

Cheese Lasagne
(Serves 6)

- 8 oz lasagne noodles or any wide noodles
 - 2 8-oz. cans tomato sauce
 - 2 cups cottage cheese
 - 1/2 tsp. basil 1 tsp. salt
 - 1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
 - 1/4 cup onion, chopped fine
 - 1/2 lb. Cheddar cheese, thinly sliced
 - 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese
 - 1/4 cup buttered bread crumbs
 - Paprika
- Cook noodles in boiling, salted water until tender; drain and rinse. Mix tomato sauce with cottage cheese, basil, salt, Worcestershire sauce and onion. Arrange layers of noodles, Cheddar cheese slices and sauce mixture in a buttered 2 1/2 qt. casserole. Top with crumbs mixed with Parmesan cheese. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake at 375° F about 25 min.

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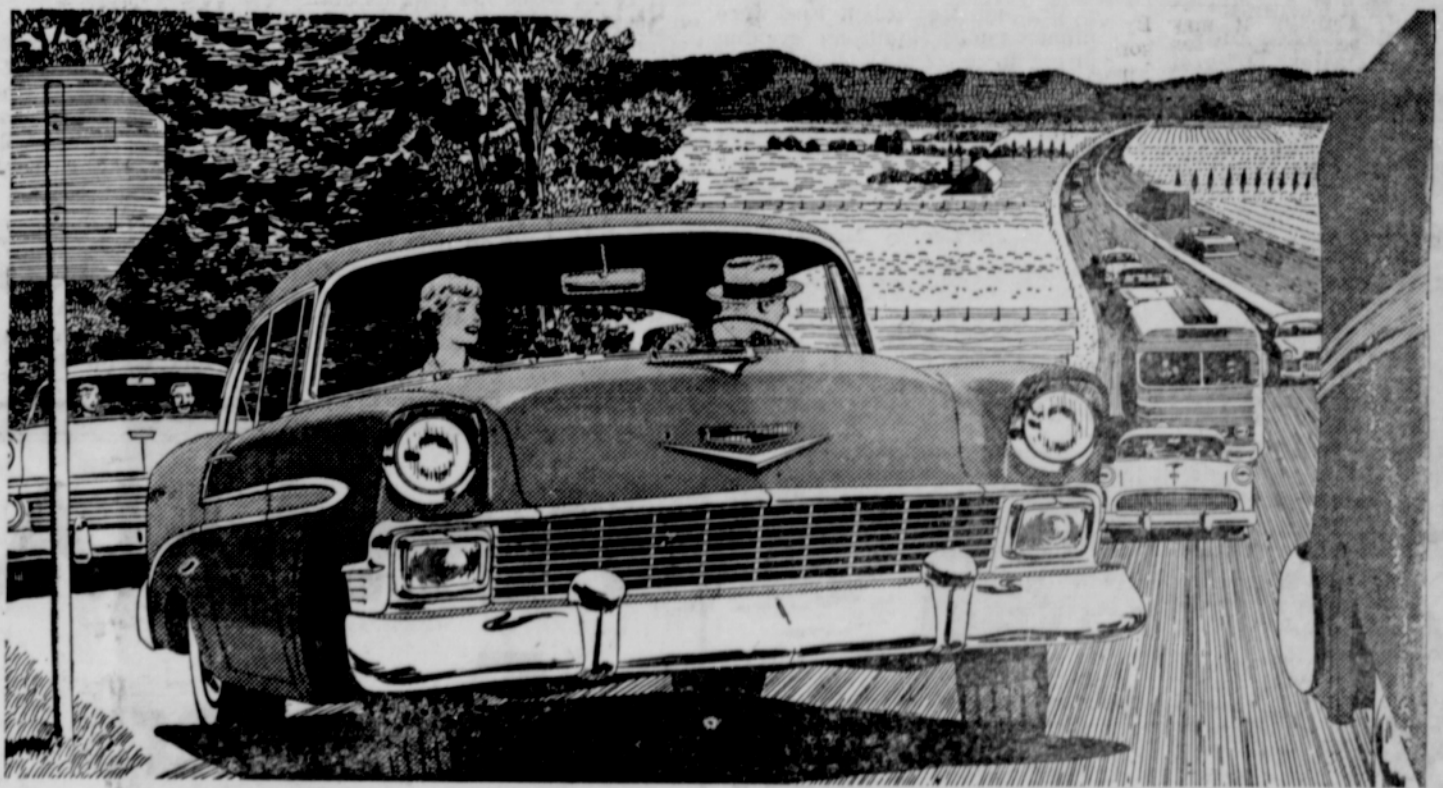
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
