### Foam Rubber Makes Furniture Fancier

Foam rubber cushioning "that conforms to body shape" is now available to homemakers in most Oregon furniture stores, says Myrtle Carter, home furnishings specialist at Oregon State.

In a new bulletin, "Using Foam Rubber," the OSC economist lists the reasons for its popularity in contemporary furniture low and right in design. Foam rubber is allergy free, moth resistant, light weight and easy to handle. Unlike sponge rubber, it distributes heat and wards off odors, she points out.

It used to be, Mrs. Carter explains, that foam rubber was used only by transportation companies in seat cushions. Today the material goes into mattresses, mops, pillows and furniture pieces. Articles of clothing such as bedroom slippers and beachwear are also being made from the rubber.

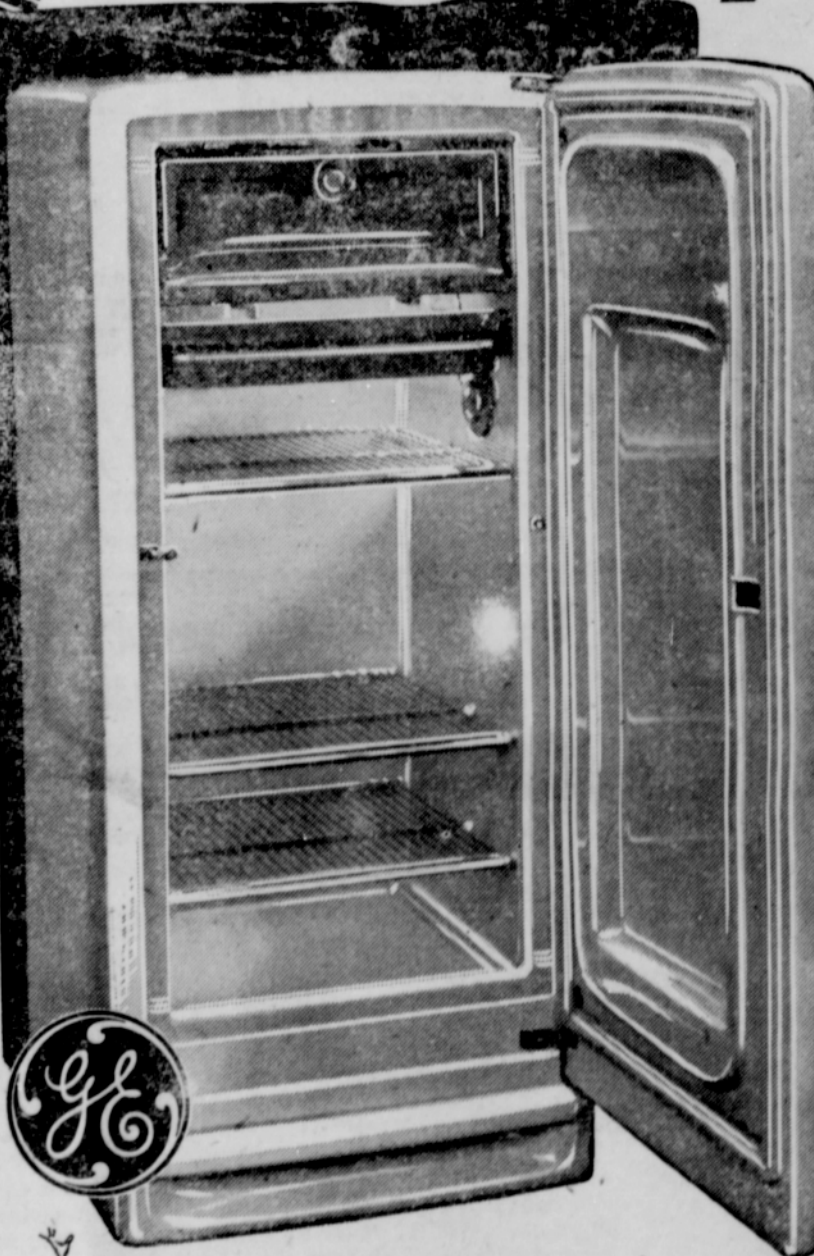
