Raising Hogs Held Feasible in Oregon

Oregon farmers with extra labor and low-priced grain aren't likely to be disappointed if they get started in hogs this year, thinks M. D. Thomas, agricultural economist at OSC.

Oregon hog prices—while far from good this winter—have been the highest in the nation, Thomas explains. And barley prices in Oregon are now as low as feed grains in many hog-producing states.

There's also a good market for hogs in Oregon. Two-thirds of the state's pork supply is now shipped in from the Midwest. This added transportation cost keeps

Oregon hog prices up, and puts Oregon hog raisers in a good position to compete with their Midwestern cousins, the economists points out.

Liquor Handled Without Serious Breakage

Approximately 12 million bottles of liquor were sold through the Oregon liquor control com-

missions's 4 stores and 130 agencies during 1955, and each was handled about five times. However, only 762 bottles were broken by the staff at a regular meeting Tuesday, a lower figure than usual and an average of about 4 1/2 bottles broken per outlet during the 12 month period. Shortages in stores also were

the lowest in history, according to F. E. Burton, stores supervisor who reported that of \$27,058,770 handled by the stores, the total shortage was \$2,439.94—a percentage loss to sales of nine-tenths of one per cent. This includes loss from all causes, including errors in cash transactions, errors in dispensing bottles and in writing sales slips. Burton credited the
