### Nitrogen Fertilizer May Also Aid Protein Content

Results of last year's tests in the Columbia basin wheat growing area underscore conclusions reached in 1953-54 experiments—nitrogen fertilizers can improve both yield and quality of the soft white wheats grown in that area. In last year's experiments, yields and protein levels of wheat from different levels of nitrogen fertilization were checked on each of 47 farms in the area, according to A. S. Hunter, OSC-USDA soil scientist in charge of the project. Protein content is considered important because millers and bakers prefer soft white wheats with a protein level from 8 to 10 percent and it has been found that the amount of nitrogen fertilizer added to the soil can affect the protein content of the wheat.

When no nitrogen was used on test plots on the 47 farms, 25 of the farms produced wheat containing less than 8 per cent protein—lower than millers and bakers prefer. This was true in spite of the fact that 1954-55 was drier than normal, the kind of year when protein levels usually are higher.

When nitrogen was added, both yields and protein content rose in most cases. But on 85 per cent of the farms tested, the rate of nitrogen that produced the highest yield produced wheat containing more than 8 but less than 10 per cent protein.

This means that in many cases, farmers gain a double benefit from the use of nitrogen—having both the yield and quality of their wheat improved. On only 15 per cent of the farms did the rate of nitrogen that produced highest yields produce wheat containing more than 10 percent protein. And in most of these cases, the protein content was only a little higher than desirable and would probably have been acceptable to millers.

On four of these farms, the protein level of the wheat was already too high before any nitrogen was added. Agriculturalists hope this information can be used, along with soil tests, to make individual fertilizer recommendations available to each farmer in the area. This would help farmers grow high quality wheat at the lowest possible cost per bushel. However, several more years of

research are needed before these specific recommendations can be made. Farmers planning to use nitrogen on their wheat are advised to contact their local county agent for a general recommendation for their locality.

Research is being carried on by the OSC agricultural experiment station and the U. S. department of agriculture. Work is done in cooperation with the experiment stations at Pendleton and Moro, and county extension agents in the Columbia basin wheat growing area. Protein content is determined by the OSC soil testing laboratory.

### ACCIDENTS UP


Thirty-five people were killed in Oregon traffic accidents during April.

The April toll wiped out the state's previously reported reduction in traffic deaths and brought the four-month count to 115, ten more than for the same period in 1955.

Last year, only 20 street and highway mishaps were counted in the state during April. Oregon's record for April brought the state more in line with a national trend which shows deaths running about 11 per cent ahead of last year.
