PROPOSITION NO. 1

In the heat of the campaign for individuals between now and November the voter should not overlook the measures that are on the ballot. Not all of them are important to the state as a whole but the first one is important. It would permit the state legislature to pass a tax bill with an emergency clause.

There are many things to be said for this measure and its opponents are saying many things against it, some of which are valid.

For it may be said that Oregon is the only state that does not permit its legislature to pass tax bills to go into immediate effect. No legislature can be held responsible—or can be responsible—for providing for the financing of the state's functions unless it has a free rein to raise the money necessary. In Oregon the people have often voted for new services and then voted against the tax measures to pay for them. They have also voted new services and then criticised the legislature for passing tax laws to pay for them. In theory, the legislature should have the authority.

Opposing the constitutional amendment is the fact that Oregon citizens have been very inclined to keep legislation in their own hands and have shown little regard for the legislature. The legislature that asks for the amendment is the same body of men who passed the 45% surtax on the income tax which is a poor indication of their knowledge of equitable taxation or of the state's needs.

Opponents of a sales tax are calling Proposition No. 1 an opening wedge to make a sales tax possible. There is inadequate proof for that statement. There is no need of getting all lathered up over a sales tax in Oregon because the people do not want it. The question on which the vote

on Proposition No. 1 should be decided is whether the voter thinks Oregon is actually going to need money in greater amounts in the near future. If the voter believes that Oregon is growing so fast that huge taxes are necessary to keep up its education, its welfare, its other services then he should vote for the measure. If he thinks the cost of government is growing faster than necessary he should vote against it.

Legislators get into a habit of voting for appropriations for state purposes even though these seem unduly large. Fine arguments are made for them; are being made now for example for education, higher and elementary. There is no statewide tax payer organization to combat such propaganda. Until there is, or until taxpayers get pinched and go to analyzing their state taxes for themselves, we will probably be buying a lot of government and a lot of services no matter who makes the tax laws.

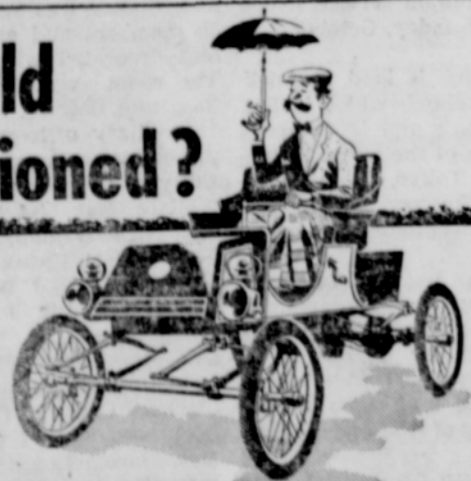

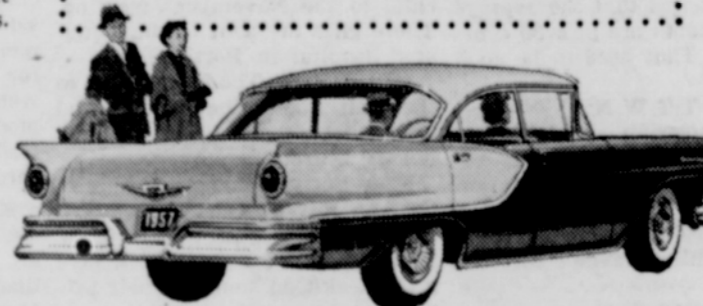
