DOUG MCKAY

No one in Oregon has held more offices and filled them satisfactorily than Doug McKay, now a candidate for the United States senate. He was mayor of Salem, itself quite a job, was state senator, a position he held during the war (an interim senator being named in his place) and was elected governor. He was appointed secretary of interior and served there until he resigned to run for the senate. Before that McKay went to Oregon State college where he worked his way through a course in agriculture while boarding with a group of eastern Oregon boys who have since become his most ardent supporters.

Doug McKay served in two world wars, the first as a lieutenant and in which he was wounded in the shoulder, the second at Camp Adair as far as they would let him go. Most of this bit of McKay history is known and it is repeated here to show that McKay is a regular citizen who has served his state and nation in whatever capacity needed. And he has done it without boasting or vainglory. At no time has he been known to say that he represented no one but himself. Rather he has been proud to represent his constituents.

Doug McKay is a friendly sort. He has many friends and makes more every time he goes among people. Even in the heat of senatorial debate he retained his friends for he did not become insulting and accuse his opponents of dishonesty or lack of honorable intentions. We are certain that he would make friends in the U. S. senate just as he has in other offices. And if there is anything Oregon needs in the U. S. senate it is friends.

Oregon also needs a working senator. We did not re-elect our working senator in 1954 and have been handicapped by having two talking senators and no working senator. Although two working senators is the best combination, a state can get along fairly well with one talking senator if the other one is a good worker. Two talking senators is a handicap no state can afford.

McKay would represent all citizens of Oregon. He is not the candidate of a group. Neither business nor labor will boss him. He has been over Oregon many times in his role as governor and as private citizen and in addition to his personal knowledge has the friendship of thousand of substantial citizens who could advise him. Furthermore he would take that advice. If Oregonians want a senator they can rely on, a senator they can talk to, (as opposed to be talked to), a senator who will represent Oregon as a state and not a single group of it, the election of Doug McKay is their way of getting it.

LEARNING TO READ

Dorothy Thompson, writing in a magazine for women says that Johnny may be learning to read but isn't learning to read anything of importance.

Well, let's see, it isn't so important to read anymore. A very small reading vocabulary will suffice in these days. One should be able to get through the funny papers with no more than eight year old's knowledge of words; the sporting pages require no more than a twelve year old mind and the radio and television will supply what ideas a man wants in simple words that don't need to be read.

Of course, this means dispensing with the ideas that have been written into books for the past two or three thousand years but what did those old fogies know about Micky Mantle?

But it seems that our sarcasm merely proves that Dorothy may be right.

We have scaled our schooling requirements down to fit the abilities of the least ambitious and least anxious to learn until anyone can get through high school without much effort. This does not mean that children do not want to learn. Most of them do. It does mean that those who don't want to or don't care can go right

on grade after grade without being failed. Come to think of it almost anyone can get through life on the same basis.

PROGRAM FOR WHEAT

It looks as if the wheat farmer might achieve his long-time goal of being able to plant all his acres, get a bumper crop and obtain the best market price for it. Since wheat farming has gotten into politics that has not been possible except in war and wheat farmers do not like to profit from the blood of their sons.

There are three developments that make all this seem possible. One is the soil bank that is going to remove many thousands of acres from wheat production. Whether a man takes any land out of wheat or lets his neighbor do it the reduction will help him. Those who do take out land, take the payment and get a crop of barley as an extra dividend, will probably do very well.

Another move by the administration that should make farmers feel much more independent is the decision to hold government wheat and let the farmer have the market. Two-thirds of export wheat can be new wheat, farmer wheat and only one-third from government stocks. The price is above the loan and farmers are selling instead of borrowing for the first time in years.

The third is the agreement between the United States and Japan and India whereunder we will ship some 400,000,000 bushels of wheat to those countries for food. Not only can this remove the surplus of wheat from the northwest (from where most of the wheat will be shipped) but it should change eating habits in the receiving countries so that we can have a permanent market.

The farmers should profit financially from these developments. And of more importance to many of them, they should again become independent from government controls that have hampered their actions for years and made them less the free individuals they traditionally preferred to be and more the pawns of an uninformed bureaucracy.

WE LIKE SAM COON

Sam Coon is running for his third term as congressman from this district. During his four years in Washington he has gotten acquainted with his job until he knows his way around the capital city. He has also made friends, a most important adjunct of any legislator.

He is opposed, for the second time, by Al Ullman who does not seem to have improved. He advocates several things that are not economically sound and puts the most emphasis on a high dam at Hells canyon, a project that is still a distant hope while private business is already building a dam which will be producing power long before the politicians are through wrangling about Hells canyon.

Coon is not so violent in his statements as Ullman, is more

reasoned in his approach to problems, has the benefit of experience and the breadth of knowledge about the district that makes him the safer candidate.
