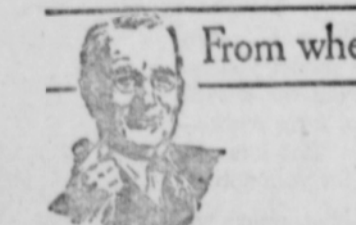


QUESTION: Can you tell me what is meant by the "right of subrogation" as applied to insurance?
