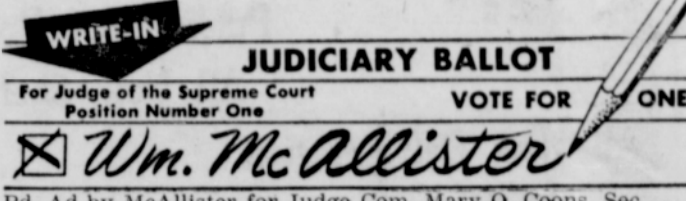

Francis Fields' OREGON CRUNCHIES

Blend 1 cup soft shortening, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 eggs. Sift together and stir in 2 1/4 cups enriched Oregon flour, 2 tsp. cream of tartar, 1 tsp. soda and 1/2 tsp. salt. Mix in 1 cup ground filberts or walnuts, chili dough. Roll into "wafer-size" balls. Roll in mixture of 1 tsp. sugar and 2 tsp. cinnamon. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheet. Bake at 400° 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned but still soft.
