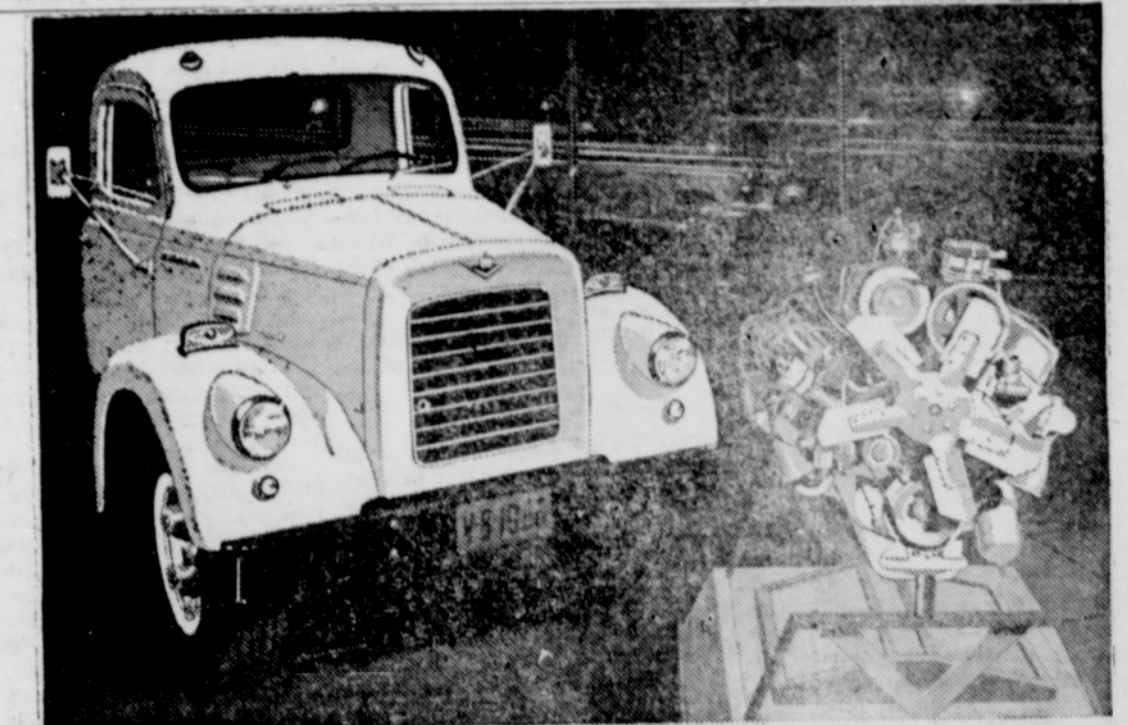
Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Eaton of Spokane, Wn., visited here over the weekend at the homes of Roy Grant and Eugene Eaton.
