Mrs. Leonard Jordan, postmistress, reminds everyone of the latest postoffice rules and the ones for the Rufus area. She says: Do not wait till the last minute to mail your Christmas mail. The mails are congested at this time and it takes more than a week for a parcel to cross the United States in normal times. Pack and wrap and tie your parcel well. You are the one responsible for the condition in which they arrive.

Keep all seals off the face of parcels and letters. Address side. Two cents will take your Christmas cards anywhere in the U. S. But will not forward or return them to you. If in doubt send them first class (three cents) in they will be forwarded. Enter your return address on all mail you send. Enclose no messages in your cards or parcels. Shop early for stamps and avoid the rush. Stamp and address your cards at home and save time.

Mail hours are: Incoming mail is here at 8 a. m. Outgoing mail must be in by 2:30 p. m. and noon
