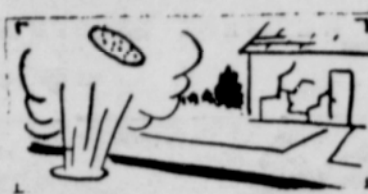

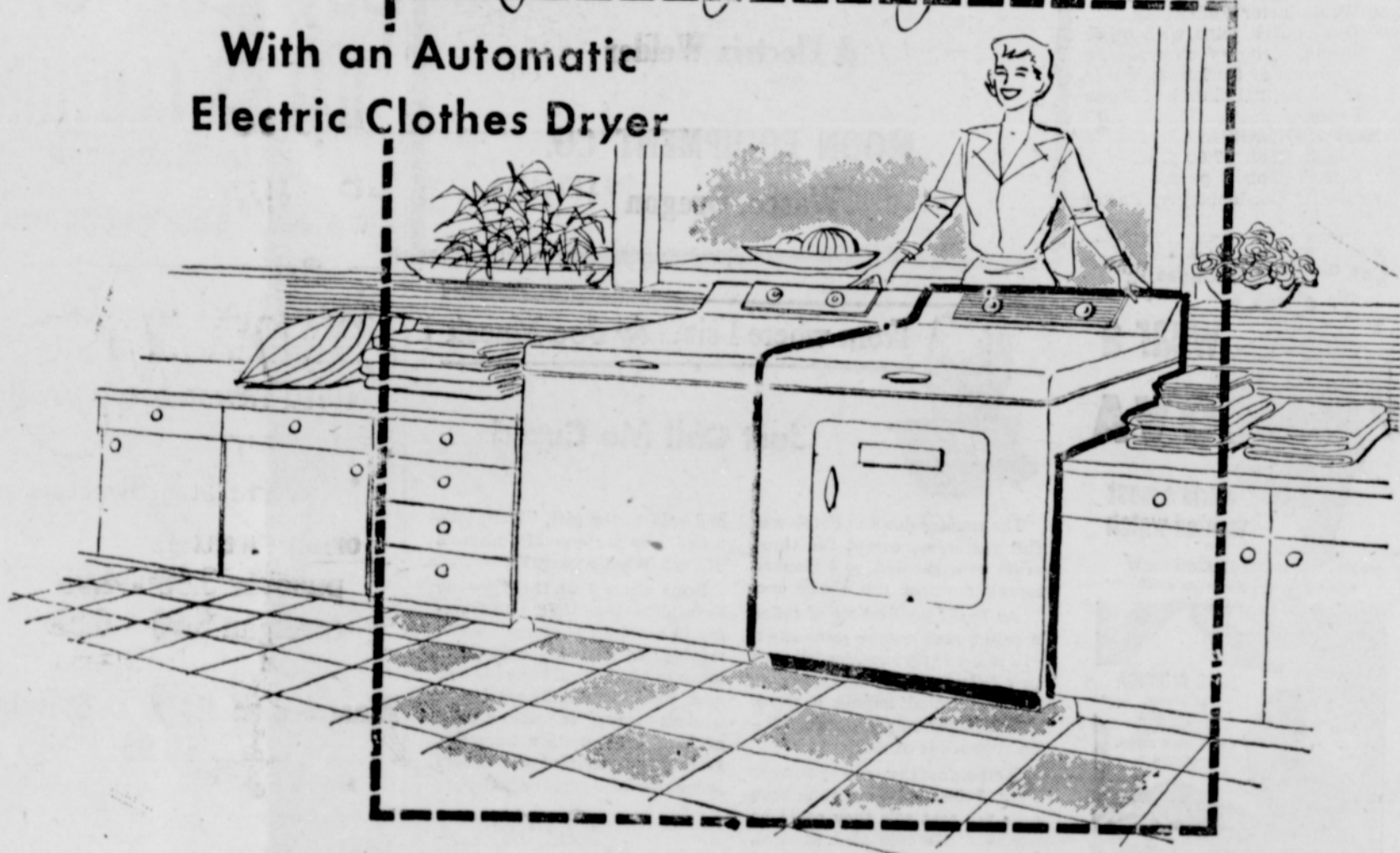

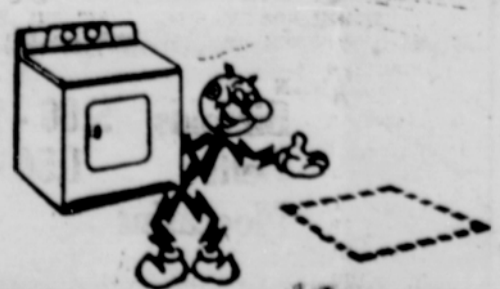

SPRITZ COOKIES

1 cup soft butter 1 tsp. vanilla or almond flavoring
2 1/2 cup sugar 2 1/2 cups sifted enriched pastry flour or
3 egg yolks 2 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

Cream butter, add sugar—mix well. Add egg yolks, flavoring—beat well. Add flour, blend well with fingers. Force dough through cookie press on to ungreased cookie sheet. 400° for 8-10 mins. 5 dozen cookies.
