**CATTLE MOVING ILLEGALLY**

Increased illegal movement of untested cattle from livestock auction markets to compulsory brucellosis test counties recently prompted the state department of agriculture to post new signs about brucellosis testing in livestock auction markets throughout Oregon.

The department posted similar signs in livestock auction markets in past years, but the signs have been destroyed or deteriorated. The signs remind all purchasers of auctioned livestock that female cattle and bulls over six months of age may be removed from auction markets under any of the following conditions: (1) the animals were tested and are free of brucellosis; (2) are moving directly to slaughter by a person having a slaughterer's license; (3) were vaccinated for brucellosis and are under 30 months of age; (4) are beef cattle moving directly to a non-compulsory brucellosis test county.

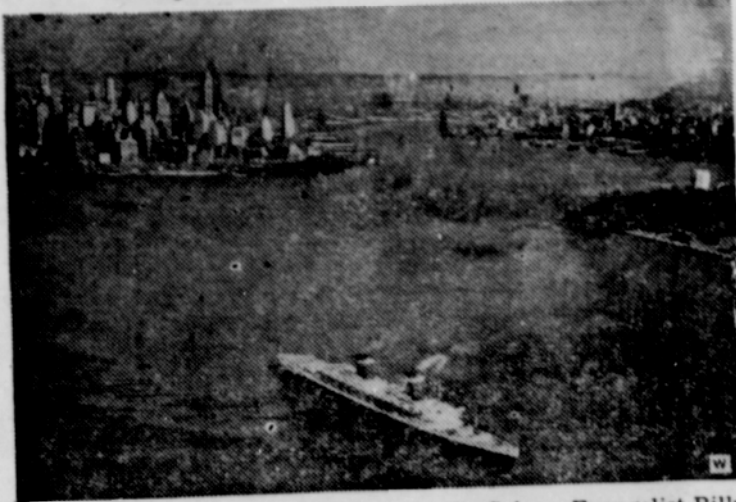

### SS United States, the World's Fastest Ship, Completes Her 100th Round Trip



Upon her arrival in New York December 13th, the SS United States, the world's fastest ship, completed her 100th voyage to and from the European ports of LeHavre, and Southampton, and includes Bremerhaven in the winter months. This record has been compiled in less than 4 1/2 years since the superliner's record-breaking maiden voyage beginning July 3, 1952.

A popular ship from the very beginning, the UNITED STATES has carried 312,878 passengers during the 4 1/2 year period which is 95% of her total capacity. She has averaged 3,128 passengers for each round trip and her passenger lists have read like a veritable Who's Who and has included the King and Queen of Greece, Haile Selassie, Emperor of Ethiopia, Prince Rainier and Duchess of Windsor, and in addition diplomats from every corner of the earth headed by ex-President Harry S. Truman and family.

From the theatre such famous names as Joan Crawford, Bob Hope, Marlon Brando, John Wayne, Rita Hayworth, Burt Lancaster, Jackie Gleason and many others aboard the world's most luxurious liner. The superliner has also carried such outstanding men in their fields as Francis Cardinal Spellman, Doctor Jonas Salk, golfer Ben Hogan, tennis

### Unemployment Grows In November

Unemployment jumped 13,400 during November to include 38,800 Oregon workers, highest since last April, according to reports from 26 local offices of the State Unemployment Compensation commission. The increase was smaller than registered at this time last year but the total number seeking work is 1,100 above last year.

While 5,300 were added to the unemployed lists in the Portland four-county metropolitan area during November, there was no change from the year-ago picture. Down state layoffs, however, were spotty compared to last year. Hood River, Lebanon, Milton-Freewater, and The Dalles reported improvement which was caused by the excellent weather for out-door activities compared to last November's unseasonal cold and wet weather. The local offices reporting the greatest relative increases in jobseekers, Roseburg, Baker, and North Bend, find the adverse lumber market causing the major portion of the layoffs. Construction, food processing and other seasonal lines also contributed to the job slackening.

### 4-H Clubs Getting Organized for 1957

Four-H clubs are being organized throughout the county during these fall and early winter months. Four-H work is the youth program of the Oregon State college extension service with the USDA and county cooperating. The program revolves around the volunteer and the work and help of the parents. Club work is voluntary on the part of the club member and it is a privilege to be a club member.

To be a 4-H member a boy or girl must be 9 years old and under 21 years of age on December 31 of the current 4-H year. The club member must agree to meet the requirements of his project and cooperate with their 4-H club leader and fellow club members. They must keep a record of their 4-H club project, turn in their 4-H enrollment cards for each of their projects.

There are many different types of activities that boys and girls can take part in. The most popular in Sherman county have been clothing, cooking, knitting and livestock projects including beef, sheep, swine and horse. Other projects available are electricity, camp cookery, poultry and rabbits, photography, wood working, food preservation and many others. If you are a parent and interested in getting your boy or girl into 4-H club work visit with some of the 4-H club leaders in your community or contact the county agent's office in Moro.
