A report just received from the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco shows that sales of Treasury Department E and H Bonds in the county last month were \$10,150.

Their total purchases of E and H Bonds last month were \$4,338, 161, up 10% compared to January 1956. It was an exceptionally good month in this state.

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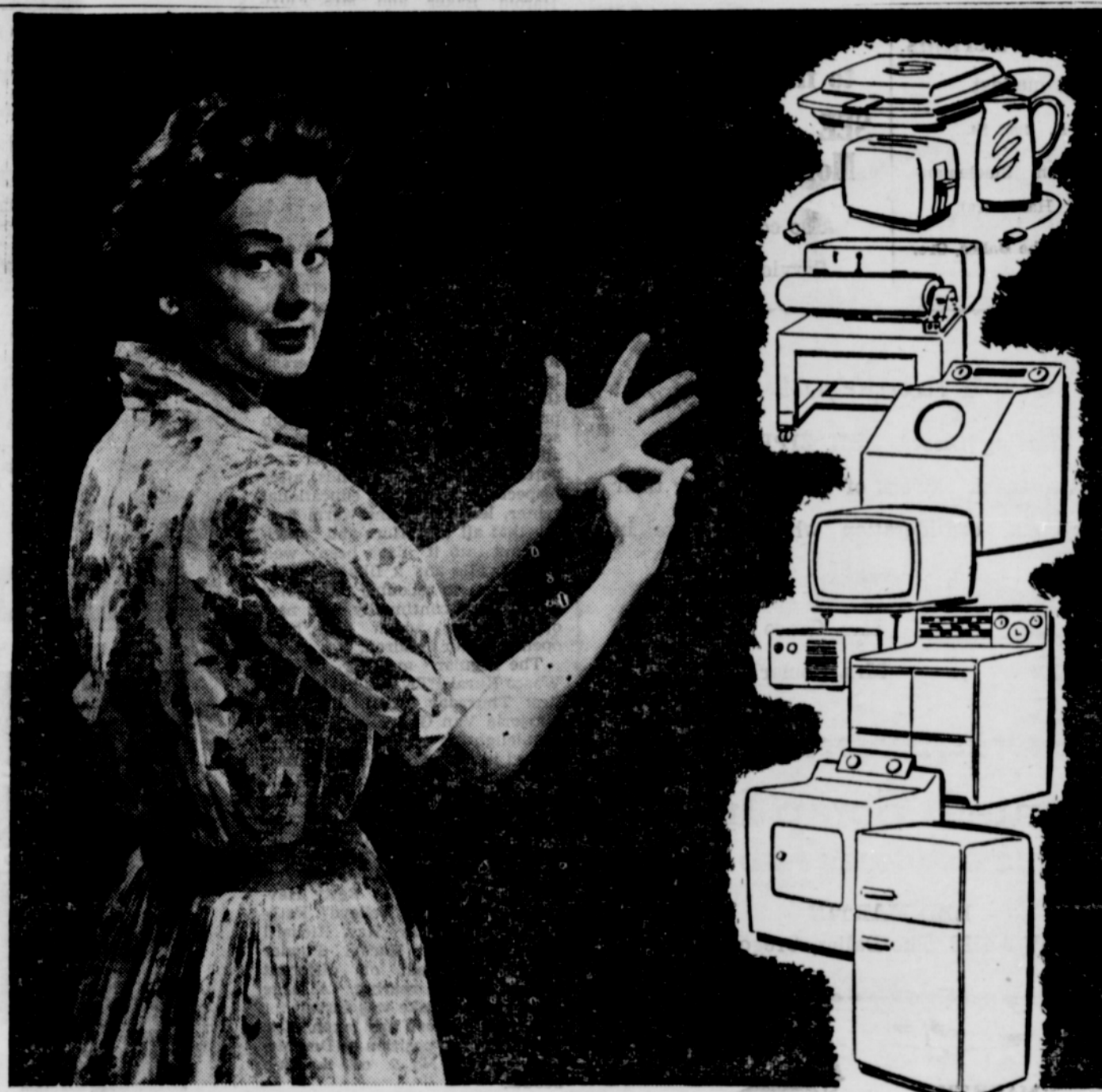
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
