State Treasurer Paying Off Debt

On March 1, State Treasurer Sig Unander deposited with the fiscal agency in the City and State of New York, \$1,693,125 with which to pay \$1,250,000 in state highway bonds and \$443,125 in interest on \$46,500,000 of such bonds.

On April 1, 1957, the state will retire \$75,000 in state highway bonds and \$1,000,000 Oregon veterans' welfare bonds issued to provide funds to make loans to veterans. On April 1, the state also will pay \$88,125 in interest on state highway bonds, \$537,807.50 in interest on veterans' welfare bonds, \$348,125 in interest on veterans' bonus bonds, and \$48,000 in interest on state reforestation bonds.

The principal payments of state bonds on March 1 and April 1, 1957, will reduce the state bonded debt to \$171,994,000 from a peak of \$183,730,900 outstanding on July 1, 1954.

Constant debt retirement or creation of sinking funds with which to pay state debt serves to enhance the credit rating of the state, according to State Treasurer Unander.
