Final Figures Found For Land By Officials

The Sherman county Board of Equalization met at the court house in Moro Monday, April 22. The purpose of this meeting was to examine the ratio study and the ratio posted by the assessor.

County Assessor Clair Balzer, informed the board, of the methods used to appraise the various classes of property in the county. He also stated, that following the Board's recommendation of last fall, the towns of Rufus, Wasco, Moro, Grass Valley and Kent, had been appraised with the help of committees, and that equalization between properties in the towns, and between the towns themselves, had been achieved to a much greater degree than they were before. This equalization of town property works in with the equalization of farm land which is now completed.

The reappraisal program is not yet complete in the county, but all values are expected to be on

the 1958-59 roll. The major part of the program left to complete is the physical appraisal of all building in the county. Farm land values will go on the roll this year.

Larry Michael, appraisal engineer of the State Tax Commission, also met with the Board of Equalization and presented the land values that will be used on the current assessment roll. The following cash values, by class and zone, are being extended on the assessment roll at this time.

The Board of Equalization, after due consideration, did adopt the ratio of 30 per cent, as posted by the assessor, for the assessment of all property in Sherman county for 1957.
