The 4-H "Hi-Yu" horse club met at the county fairgrounds Sunday afternoon, April 28, with their horses. The horsemanship team-demonstrations, as appointed by our President John Fields, at our last meeting, were given in the arena at the fairgrounds. All first year members displayed their own horse under all gaits, using proper "leads" and "leg-Aids," and receiving advice and help, whenever necessary. The 4-H drill team was formed, matching horses in size, color and markings, as close as was possible. John Fields and Phyllis Watkins are to be the two front key leaders, as they have well-matched chestnuts. A very simple routine was practiced, since, neither rider nor horse has ever been in a drill, before.

An extremely brief meeting was held as the hour was very late when we were through with our horsemanship work. Our next meeting will be held Saturday afternoon, May 14, at the fairgrounds with the horses, to continue the formation of our drill team, while it is still fresh in our minds.
