OREGON ANALYSIS

The Oregon Journal has sent a reporter around to some of the state's larger towns to survey the economic situation and the East Oregonian editor made a similar trip last winter. The legislature has just finished its biennial hassle with the state's economy which always stirs up ideas about what is wrong with the state. Anyone can have an opinion on such things as freely as he can criticize the pitcher's fast ball. Here goes.

Oregon is suffering from an excess of democracy and we don't mean a political party. It is trying to do too many things for too many people who would be better off without it and who do not appreciate it, nor pay their share of it. We have made the state government and all other governments into grab bags for enough hare-brained schemes to break us. And it has.

Oregon is dependent on the timber industry to a large extent and it is now going into a sort of an eclipse because building boom as we have had since the war couldn't go on forever. Prices were too high and other materials are being used and will continue to be used in greater degree. Besides Oregon, except in very few cases, does any manufacturing with lumber. It ships it outside the state in the roughest possible state. That is partly because of labor which gets higher wages in Oregon than in almost any other state.

Oregon agriculture is in pretty good shape and the touring editors found towns based on agriculture more stable than those based on timber. Yet, too large a percent of Oregon agriculture is tied up with federal programs that have made it dependent on federal grants instead of individual farmer initiative. Public Law 480 and the work of the Wheat League have helped this condition but that may be temporary.

Oregon's tax laws are not so important as opponents often state them to be but the general trend of taxes in Oregon is to go up too fast and to penalize individuals and business. Business is managed by individuals and managers do not like to come into a state with a high income tax. Oregon does not have a big enough population to make it a good place for many manufacturing firms that depend on a local market. Oregon has very poor transportation. And Oregon has a comparatively small percentage of tillable land. These last three are major factors.

Cheap power is a small factor and so far it has been helpful in bringing little but aluminum plants that give very little employment and use up a lot of cheap power. The fight over public versus private power that so delights our politicians is on a par with the old game of getting a dog to pull a badger out of a barrel—and about as useless.

It is our opinion that eventually Oregonians will decide that they will have to go to work and do something for themselves, start some factories, find some markets. And above all take responsibility for their future and quit expecting state government to settle their futures.

WHITHER REPUBLICANS

An Oregonian editor, miffed perhaps at the reluctance of the legislature to accept the program of that paper for a state power commission, opines in a lengthy editorial that the party is doomed unless it mends its ways. Senate Republicans, it seems, tolled the knell of the party by refusal to vote for the bill setting up the commission.

We are very sad about that and had had some hopes for a revival of Republican control in Oregon, hopes that were whetted to a sharp edge by review of the two legislative sessions controlled by Democrats in the past twenty years. It has seemed to us that Oregonians were basically conservative and not given to radical ideas.

That does not mean that Oregonians are never radical. As to that they seem to resemble a periodical drinker who stays so-

ber and sedate for months and then indulges in a binge that often brings the cops. It may cleanse the soul but it usually makes a heck of a mess. The simile holds true even to the remorse that follows.

Fact is that Oregon voters have never, as a whole, been caught in a radical mood when voting on a public power proposal. Which doesn't mean that they might not some day. There is some doubt that the Oregonians proposal about a state power authority would really serve to render inapplicable the preference clause that is damaging the state. It needs more study before enactment and we think it might end up in something valuable.

If we were to pick on one thing that had more to do with the 1956 Republican defeat than any other it would be the 45 per cent surtax and its somewhat extravagant approval of state expenses a part of which was done in an effort to meet Democratic criticism. Now that Democrats have boosted the 45 per cent to 51 per cent and utilized a Republican surplus of some \$36,000,000 to keep it from being 71 per cent it looks like a fine time for a conservative party to come to power. Budgets grow like weeds and Oregon needs to do some hoeing.

If we are to admit that the Republicans are the conservative party—and one could get an argument on that—there is no likelihood of it being put in permanent limbo as the Oregonian's editor threatens. There will always be conservatives, just as there will always be radicals. That is the way it ought to be. It appears that the radicals have had their day, and like radicals always do, have emptied the cookie jar of the family savings, bought a lot of stuff on time and made some promises that were not carefully considered. It is time to put up the bottle and go back to work.

QUICK WRITE - OFF

It may well be that the big argument over the Idaho Power company's fast tax write-off on its Snake river dam will be the reason for repealing the law that gives such write-offs. It was a concession made to contractors during the war to encourage them to build defense plants and take their depreciation quickly. No manufacturer could be expected to build for war time and take the usual fifty years of depreciation. He would never have gotten more than five years of it before the end of war.

The Idaho Power applied and its request was granted. Hundreds of others have been granted for other projects of similar nature. It isn't a steal but we do think it is using a law that should have been repealed at the end of the war.

While Idaho Power will get its write-off and save some taxes in the next five years it will save no taxes in a fifty year period. When the whole investment is written-off its taxes will be higher. If taxes go down it will cost it money. It will get a big advantage by saving money now and money can bring interest.

It is natural for humans to find nothing good in things they dislike and Oregon's radical congressional delegation dislikes Idaho Power. It is not because it is a power company so much; it is a private power company and private business is suspect to our delegates in congress. Worst of all is that Idaho Power is building the dams the Hells canyon fanatics want the federal government to build. And humans hate the one that beats them.

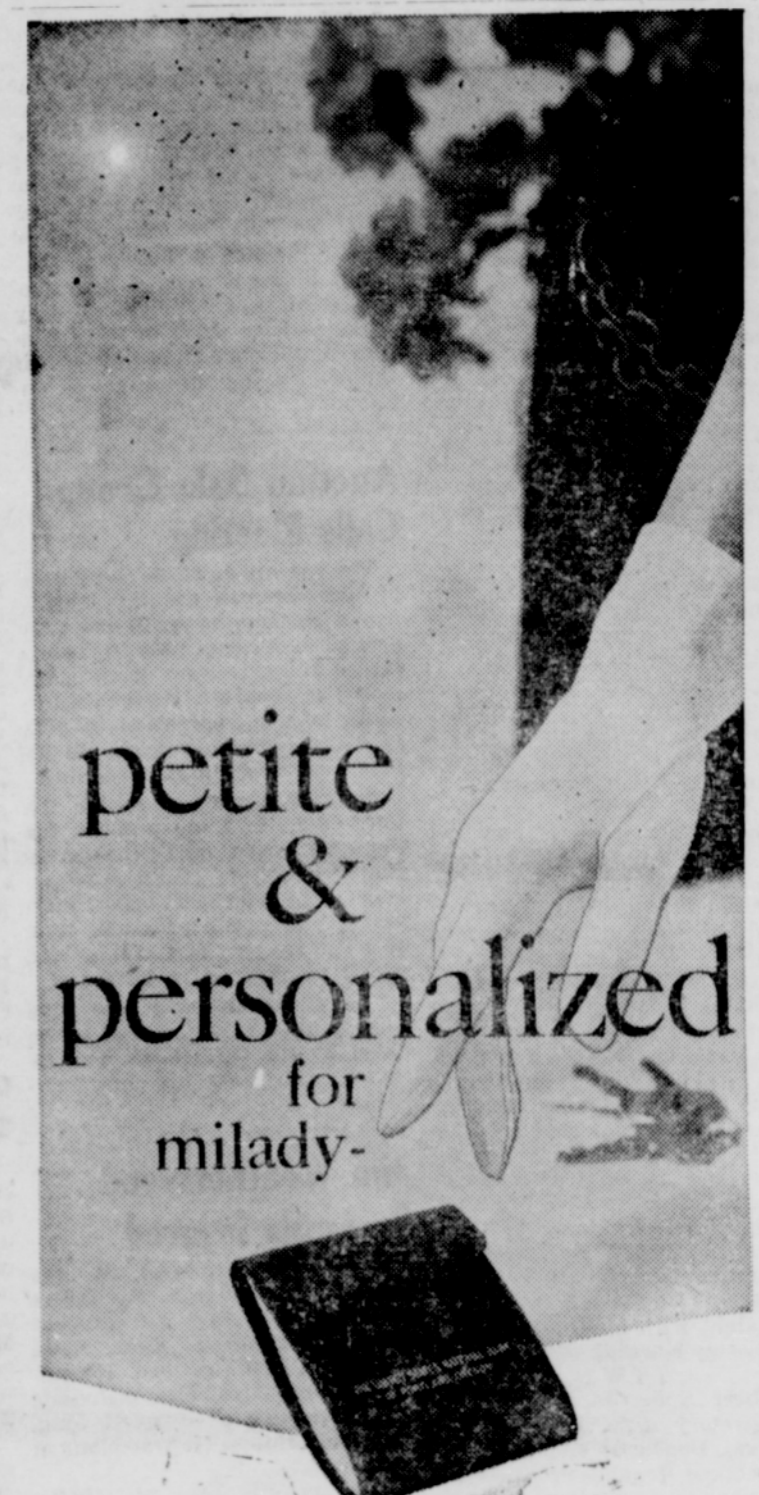
