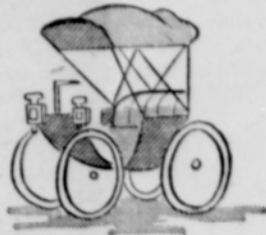

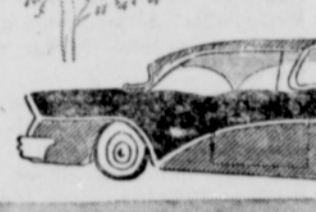

the last session and social events planned for the women.

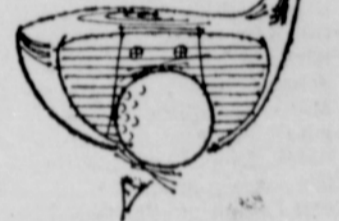
The date for the Father-Son banquet has been changed to Friday, June 21 at 6:30 p. m. Tickets will be \$1.50 each.
