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Subject to full board approval, the finance and building committees of Oregon's State Board of Higher Education Tuesday, during a special session in Portland, authorized acceptance of the 1957-58 \$31,160,300 operating budget for campus instruction, general services and state-wide public services, and recommended approval of a \$7,000,000 general plan for state-financed building construction for the 1957-59 biennium.

In presenting the budget to the committees, Chancellor John R. Richards, emphasized that full use was made of the entire salary adjustment fund urgently needed for academic staff as approved by the 1957 legislature.
