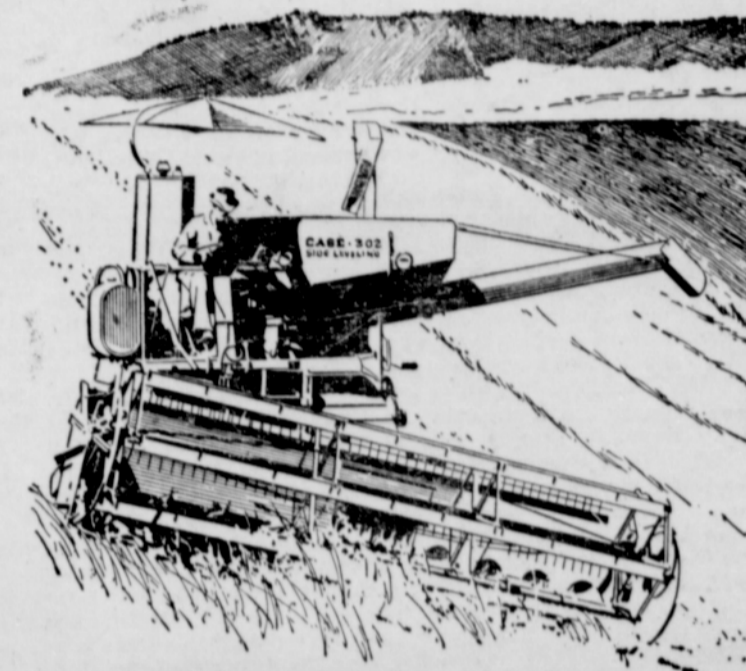
BUSY BAKERS BUZZ

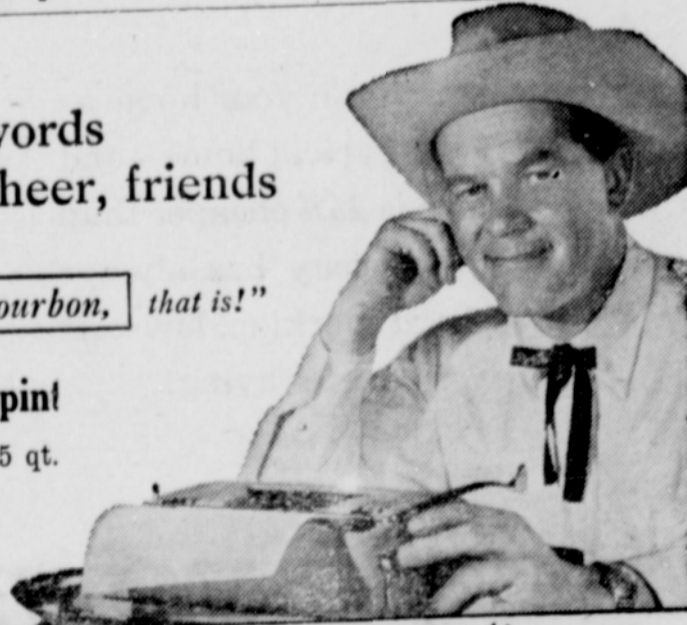
