This vacation map is based on business surveys which indicate that during the year, 85,000,000 persons will go on vacation with 70,000,000 traveling by car. The most popular vacation area appears to be the North Atlantic States from New Jersey upward. Other popular areas are around Lake Michigan, out on the Pacific Coast and along the South Atlantic Coast. However, there are many popular vacation states outside these areas. About \$20 billion is spent annually having fun and relaxing.

**Easy Come, Easy Go IS Same, Sad Song**

Fatter paychecks lined the American worker's pockets last year, but his money went out as fast as it came in.

Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college, reports that wage earners made more money, but they spent it and more, for both durable and nondurable goods. Houses, automobiles and major household equipment were among larger expenditures. More people now own their own homes and cars but they still have a lot of unpaid bills, and continue to pile up debt.

In the national survey reported by Mrs. Horrell, a buy-sell barter seemed to link together sales and purchases made last year. A third of the people who bought houses sold another house at the same time of purchase. Four-fifths of the people buying new cars and half of those buying used cars sold or traded cars along with their new purchases.

Fewer trade-ins were made on used car purchases because many of the used car buyers were younger people entering the car market for the first time.

**Anyway To Live Long Interests Doctors**

When some centenarian explains his long life as the result of not arguing before breakfast or of drinking a pint of corn whiskey with lunch, scientists listen with interest.

They have discovered that comments like these fortify a medical conviction that sustained growth and vigor in old age depend to a large degree on some positive motive for living.

Without motive, a person might be "old" at 35, with it he might be "young" at 70, according to a special article on aging in the current (July 27) Journal of the American Medical Association.

The population of Americans over 65 is increasing at twice the rate of the over-all population rise, the article said. With the increase in numbers there is developing the problem of "how to create a proper climate for senior citizens to grow with their age rather than stagnate in a tremendously expensive wait for death," an accompanying editorial said.

"Since medical science is largely responsible for this increased longevity, physicians everywhere must bear much of the burden of also prolonging man's span of vigor. It is a mammoth task, calling for action and planning in many fields besides medicine," the editorial said.

**More Than One A Day Will Die During August**

Oregon can expect a traffic death toll of about 44 persons during the month of August, the Oregon State Motor association warned today. The figure is based on the average fatality toll for that month during the ten-year period 1946-56.

"August has the highest fatality average of any month during the year," Charles Snell, president of the Oregon AAA club declared. "Probably one of the prime reasons for this high average is the greater number of persons on the road during that month. Vacation travel, weekend trips and general summer use of motor vehicles makes for the high concentration of traffic during the month of August."

"For that reason, motorists and pedestrians should exercise greater care than usual when they are in traffic in August. If drivers and walkers would take into consideration the fact that the exposure to accident is much greater during August and adjust their driving and walking accordingly, we could cut down the high accident toll."

President Snell suggested these steps to avoid August accidents:

1. Whenever you are driving in congested traffic, avoid rear bumper riding, don't take chances on passing in the face of oncoming cars, never change lanes without checking to make sure the way is clear.
2. Remember that driving while fatigued or sleepy is dangerous because the individual's reaction time is increased, the ability to perceive danger is lessened, and the possibility of falling asleep at the wheel is always present.
3. Watch out for highway hypnosis. Steady driving speeds, particularly on freeways, the monotony of the sound of the motor and the concentration on the road ahead can cause hypnosis. To avoid this dangerous condition, vary speed occasionally, sweep your eyes from side to side, use the radio to help divert your concentration on the sound of the motor, and stop occasionally to break the speed of driving.

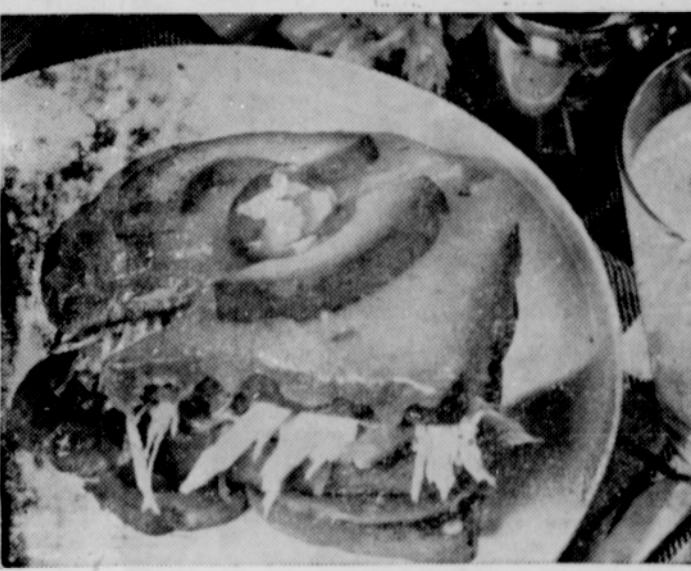
