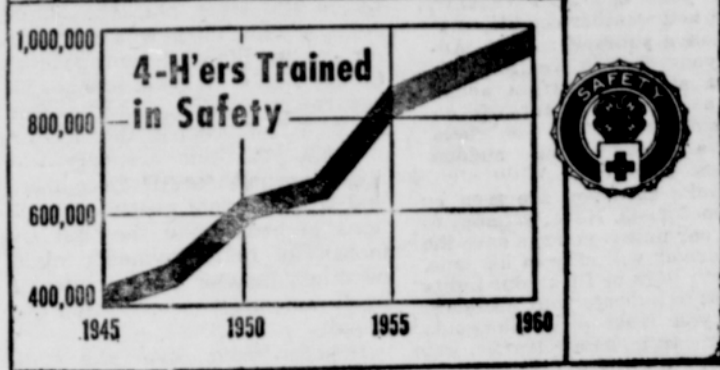

**Spectacle For Washington State Visitors**



**OLYMPIA, WASH.**—One of the most spectacular sights for travelers in all the West is the tremendous, prehistoric Dry Falls in the central part of Washington State. In five sweeping horseshoes, almost two miles long, a prehistoric Columbia River once thundered down those towering walls into a basin more than 400 feet deep. This was the largest waterfall the world has ever known.

Sometime following the ice age the mighty Columbia River changed course and the falls dried up, leaving this silent, inspiring monument to a past era.

Nearby is the Grand Coulee, the former floor of the ancient river, rimmed with towering basaltic walls from 600 to 800 feet high.
