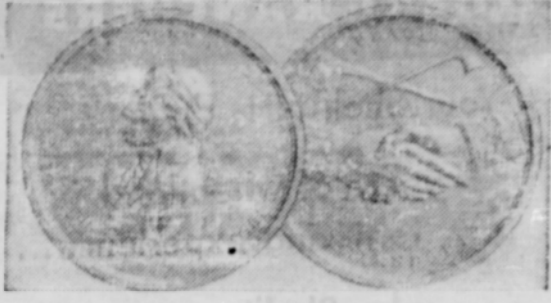


This Week's HISTORY MYSTERY



What Part Did This Medal Play in Oregon's History?

CLUE: These medals were made in three sizes and grades. This is the largest and was most preferred because it bears the likeness of President Thomas Jefferson. The reverse side shows the clasped hands, pipe and war axe crossed, with the legend "Peace and Friendship."

ANSWER: Such medals were carried by Captains Lewis and Clark for distribution to Indian chiefs that they met during their journeys. The remains of an original chief's medal was found on an island in the Columbia River northeast of Hermon in the 1890's. It is now on display at the Oregon Historical Society.

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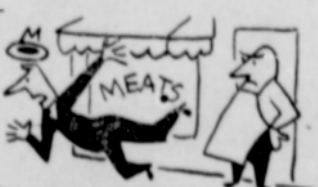

These Things We Note

It has really been a wet year in the country south of Bend. A strip from Klamath clear through to the Idaho line has been well soaked all year with the result that grass is high in the upland meadows, the Williamson and Sprague rivers run deep from the Sycan and Klamath marshes and the cattle are fat. Great piles of hay left over from last year and dark and unpalatable looking are piled everywhere. Question is, whether feeders will go up because there is plenty of feed or hay will go down because there is another good crop. With some shortage of employment in Oregon funds for a big beef eating year may not be available.

Red Bluff is the location of the annual February bull sale, known to all cattlemen. It is a neat little town of 5500 started in 1849 when a man named Ide built an adobe hut here. It largely cattle country and was once head of navigation on the Sacramento river which starts with a sort of infamously bang between Weed and Dunsuir with what is called Big Springs, and drops 3500 feet in a deep gorge to the 304 foot elevation of Red Bluff. That is, it did drop. Now the Shasta dam has built a big lake that runs up the canyons and makes water sports available for northern Californians who apparently grasp a water ski rope as adeptly as their grand fathers held a lariat.

California, aided and abetted by the federal government, is doing a good deal to remedy bad road conditions that formerly existed between that canyon town of Dunsuir and Redding. The road runs through the Siskiyous and nothing but an airplane can make it smooth and straight, but the sharp curves are being stretched out until one long one does for four or five of the former short ones and the road has been widened over much of the course and it isn't as bad as it used to be. Neither is it anything to con-template with pleasure. But if one must travel one must expect his moments of close concentration to the yellow line, the oncoming traffic, the burning sun on the sticky seat, just as if one must live he must expect days of paying attention to business.

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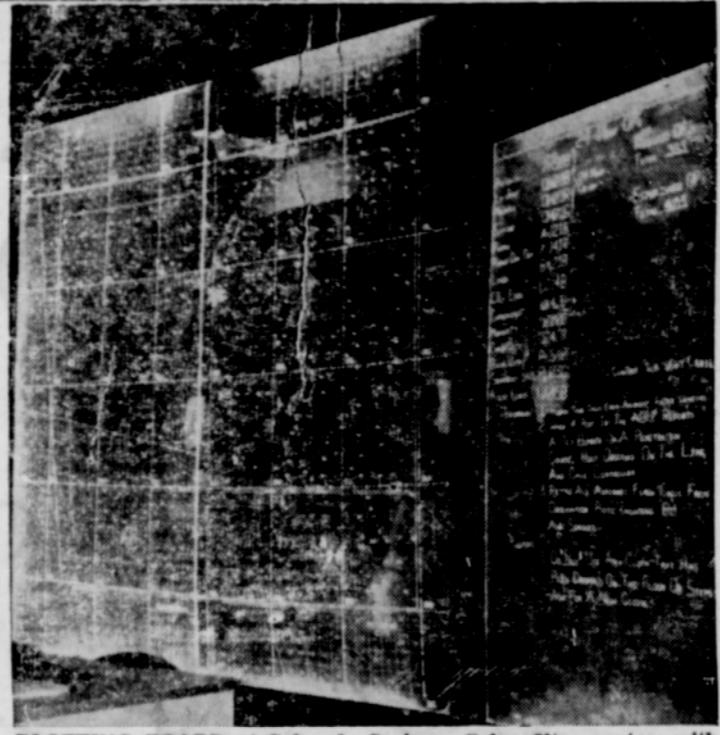
