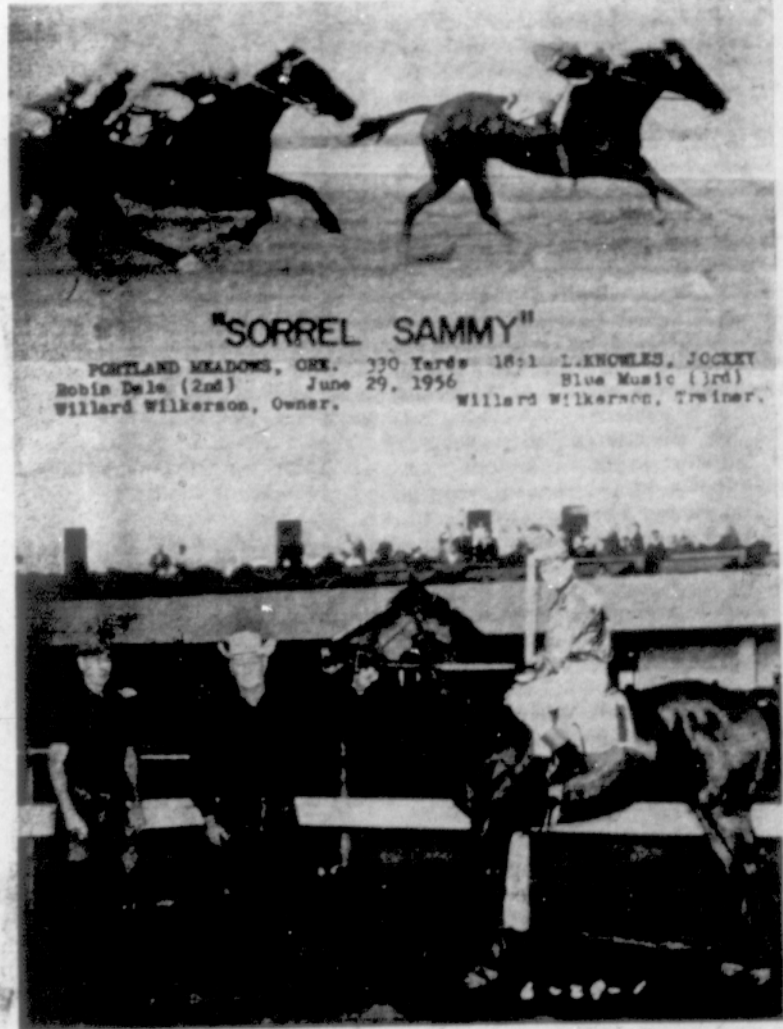
# Sherman County FAIR

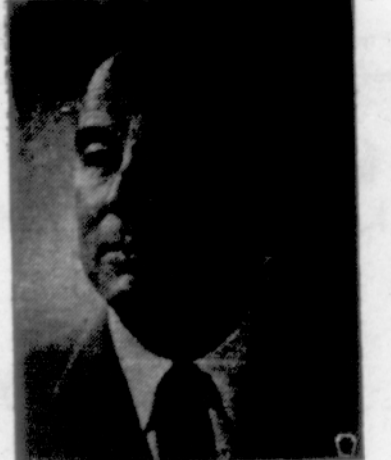

**Farm Expert Sees Rise In Land Values**



Robert M. Chamberlain, SAN FRANCISCO, CAL.—Steady increases in farmland values throughout the West are predicted for the remainder of this year by one of the nation's leading rural real estate experts.

Robert M. Chamberlain, president of United Farm Agency, nationwide rural real estate firm, reports that values of farm land have increased a total of 15% since the post-Korean low and every indication is that this upward trend will continue. He adds that among predominantly agricultural areas, California now leads all other states in farmland values with an average of \$263 per acre.

United, which ranks as one of the nation's largest exclusive rural real estate brokers, recently reported sales figures for 1956 showing a 28% increase in total gross volume over the previous year for California and Oregon.

Major factors contributing to the increasing values of the West's farm land, according to Chamberlain, are rapid population gains—resulting in greater needs for space—combined with gradually ascending farm income, and the generally healthy condition of the U. S. economy.
