Meat Inspection Pilot Program Gets Start

The final report on the pilot program of compulsory meat inspection was released this week by the state department of agriculture. That program was fore-runner of the full-time compulsory meat inspection now being put into operation area by area.

The pilot program, the report points out, operated for eight weeks in broken periods of three, two and three weeks in 106 non-inspected plants from October 1, 1955 through June 1957.

Under the pilot studies, 59-100th of 1 per cent of the 24,591 animals inspected were condemned. Condemnations on post mortem or immediately after slaughter numbered 137 or about 14 to 1 compared with condemnation of

live animals.

The report notes that condemnations under the pilot program were slightly higher than under the three other types of inspection (city, federal and voluntary state) in progress in plants during the same period.

In addition to whole animal condemnations, the pilot inspectors destroyed 7,603 livers, heads, hearts, tongues and kidneys. Ninety-three percent were livers.

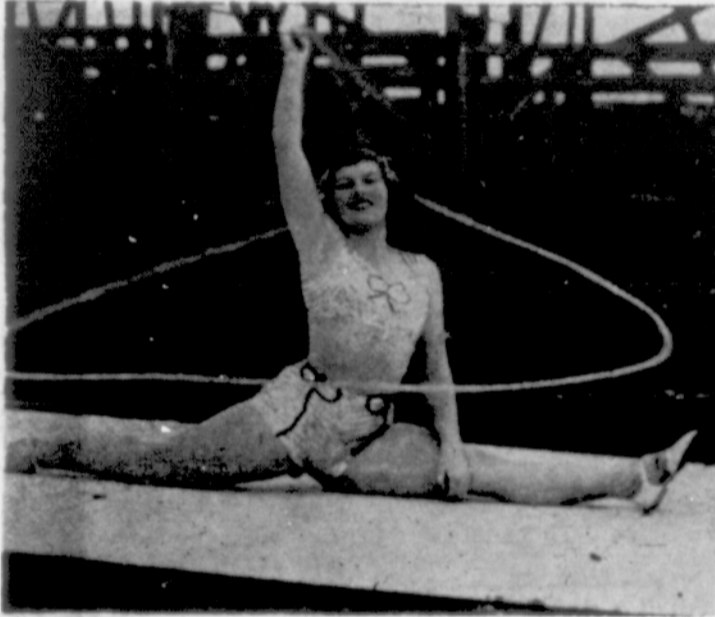
