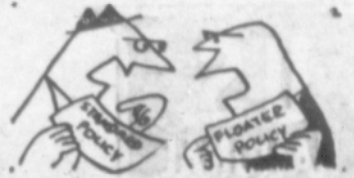

Wheat Farmers Must Make Plans Soon

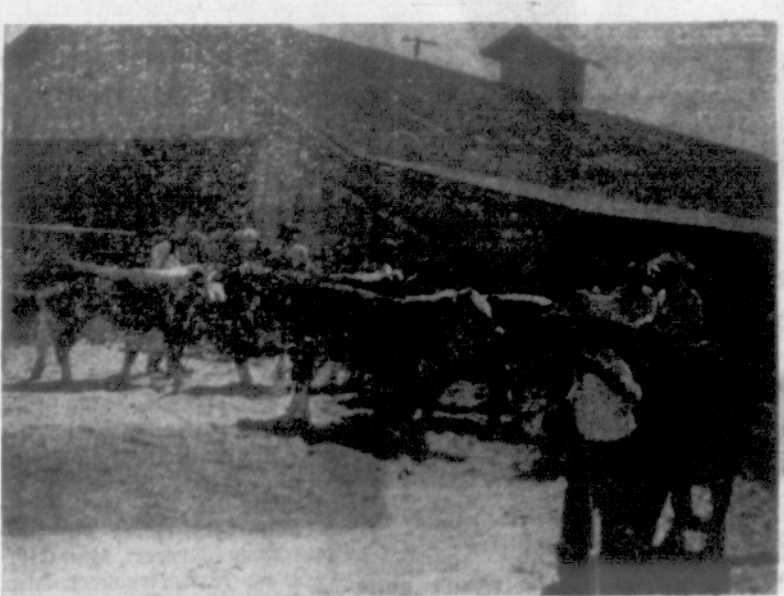
Oregon wheat producers must decide soon if they want to take part in the 1958 acreage reserve program of the Soil Bank, reminds Ray H. Teal, extension seed and grain marketing specialist at Oregon State college.

Signup period for the acreage reserve closes October 4, Teal says. This means farmers who want to take part in the program should drop into their county agricultural stabilization and conservation (ASC) office soon so a contract can be drawn up in time for them to sign before the deadline.

All farmers who have an "old farm" wheat acreage allotment for 1958 and who normally grow winter wheat are eligible to sign a winter wheat acreage reserve agreement under the 1958 Soil Bank, Teal reports. The acreage reserve makes it possible for farmers to take some of their poorer or hard-to-farm land out of crop production and still get a fair income from it.

Putting land under the acreage reserve should also help cut the present surplus stocks of wheat, Teal pointed out. The plan does not affect farmers' wheat allotments in future years.

In addition, farmers who took part in the 1957 wheat acreage reserve program will be paid a 10 per cent premium above their regular 1958 compensation rate if they put the identical land in the 1958 program.

Office Help Needed In Overseas Offices Of Government
If you are a high school graduate between the ages of 21 and 35, single with no dependents, in excellent health and have been an American citizen for at least five years, you can make your dreams of travel come true, but you must be willing to go anywhere in the world. Your first step is an interview at the Oregon State Employment Service, 1437 Southwest Fourth Avenue, in Portland, between September 23 and October 4. Office hours are from 9 a. m. to 4:30 daily and until 7 p. m. on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Secretarial positions offering a starting salary of \$3800 a year require a typing speed of 50 words a minute, shorthand at 96 words a minute and four years of work experience—one year of which must be in the secretarial field. Salaries are supplemented by free housing or a housing allowance, at some posts a cost-of-living allowance, and a 10 to 25 per cent post differential for duty in hardship areas. For instance, a stenographer in Saigon, Viet-Nam, receives \$6700 a year; in Caracas, Venezuela, \$6800 a year; and in Madrid, Spain, \$4290 a year. Between each two-year tour of duty, employees receive an additional six weeks of paid vacation for vacationing at their homes in the States. All travel is at government expense. Bond Sales
Sales of Series E Savings Bonds in Oregon were higher in August than in any other month since January, 1956, according to word received here today. Oregonians bought \$2,988,176 worth of these popular securities last month. Total sales of E and H Bonds amounted to \$3,732,632, highest since January. However, even this huge volume was off 13% compared to August, 1956, when H Bond sales were the highest ever. Savings Bond sales in this county last month were \$4244. A year ago they were \$608.

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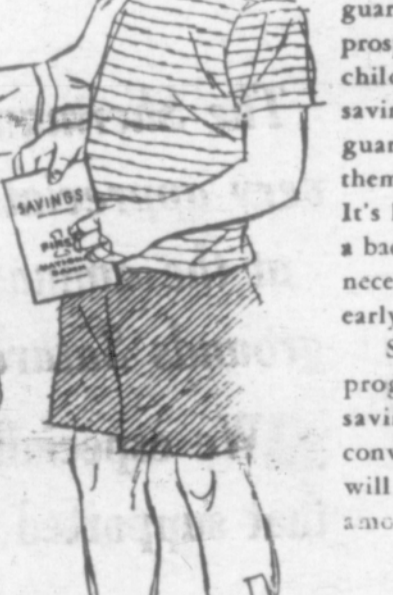
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
