Educational TV Starts At College

A chemistry class in the corner room of the Oregon State college will draw more "viewers" next week than any of the championship basketball games ever staged in the giant 11,000-seat structure.

The class will be part of an experiment in educational television. The audience will be watching from four different college campuses and from homes extending from Cottage Grove to above Salem.

Chemistry will be only one of three classes presented this fall term over KOAC-TV, Channel 7, by the state system of higher education. A course in U. S. history and one in school and American life will originate on the University of Oregon campus this fall. The telecourses will begin October 7.

Taking the courses will be students at OSC, U. of O., Oregon Education at Monmouth and Willamette university, which asked to be included in the state system experiment since it is within the receiving area for the telecasts.

Student attitude toward the TV class spring term was "generally favorable," according to Dr. Wendell Slabaugh, course instructor. Some students said the TV cameras let them see the chemistry demonstrations "closer up" than regular lectures.
