The regular meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary was held Monday with President Mrs. Dewey Thomas, presiding. The secretary gave her report, and the treasurer reported that \$50.70 was made on the recent bake sale. The president gave a report on the district conference held October 31 at Condon, with the following points stressed: the week starting Nov. 24 is Americanism Week and it was urged that the display of the flag be made in town as much as possible, and also that the First Aid and Home Nursing be encouraged in the unit. It was reported that the Auxiliary had contributed more money for the Crusade for Freedom than any other organization. A motion was made to send \$10 to Christmas Cheer. She told of another visit to the Roseburg hospital and reported that the men there would like cigarette lighters. The unit was also asked to make paper flowers for the wheelchair parade which is held during Rose Festival week at Portland hospital. Her last report was on civilian defense and the unit was urged to sponsor the program of identification tagging of school children. This program is to be presented to the PTA. Many lovely gifts were received by the members to be sent to the Portland gift shop. After the closing of the meeting, refreshments were served to 15 members and one guest.

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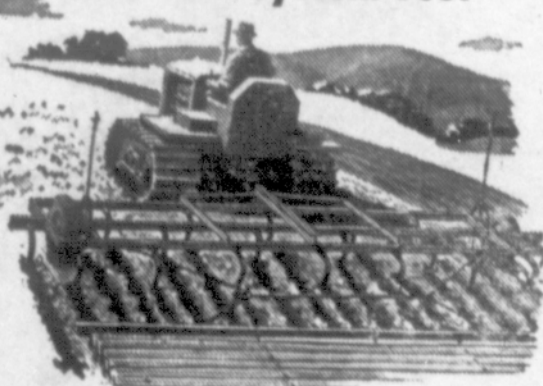
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
