Mrs. Carroll Sayrs is a sort of unofficial aide to the Magazines for Friendship campaign that sends magazines to readers in other countries for distribution to those who want to learn about the United States. The persons who distribute these magazines are themselves interested in teaching about democracy and find they can best do it by giving this sort of information about this country.

Excerpts from a letter from India expresses this very clearly: "These magazines are quiet, silent but effective ambassadors of peace, justice and understanding, in contrast to the usual commie magazines preaching hatred and bitterness. To you all therefore who have sponsored this scheme, my sincere thanks. May God reward you for it all. . . What is appreciated most? The Reader's Digest, news magazines, the Saturday Evening Post, etc. All these magazines are eagerly looked forward to, gratefully received, read and passed on to others from factory to factory, from one labor camp to another, from mining areas to steel mills."

Old magazines in this country are a disposal problem and may usually be found piled in a corner ready to slide out into the path of the householder. It costs but little to mail them abroad where they can do so much good if the letters received are fair indicators of their value.

EZRA AND THE CRITICS

Ezra Benson has a given name that might be confused with that of one of the old testament prophets and he has a disposition that might let him into that charmed circle as well. Nearly every day some one hopefully reports that Mr. Benson is going to resign or be kicked out or elevated to some prepared job. And Mr. Benson steadily says it isn't so, that he is going to stay as long as he is wanted, but that he will return to Utah and take up his church duties at any time when he says his services are no longer needed.

No one is going to be a popular secretary of agriculture as long as so many farmers are getting so much from the government. Every one wants to expand his income naturally, and if government provides the income, the government is blamed if it seems inadequate.

Mr. Benson thinks that farmers will never be prosperous or happy as long as they are under the control of the government and experience surely proves him correct. Neither politics, nor enemies, nor criticism has swerved Mr. Benson from his beliefs. He is resolute enough to be an old testament prophet.

Of course they are going to find a way to remove Mr. Benson some day. There are too few in government who can abide unpopularity even when diluted with good economics and those whom he has opposed will cheer lustily and prepare their cases to influence his successor. If he should be a politician and grant more aid with accompanying restrictions the farmers will live to rue it.

It may be difficult to get one assessor to start a custom different from the practice of his colleagues but it would be desirable if some of them would. Certainly if they do not the legislature will soon set limits for assessor's ratios and assessors will have lost another of their prerogatives.

Reading about the opposition of some outdoor club to a proposed dam and the testimony attendant thereto caused a question to arise as to the real interest of such clubs. We have lots of them, mostly with an interest in fish and game but some more concerned with flowers and birds.

CAR SALES DOWN

Americans are not buying the new cars with quite the speed the manufacturers expected although the new models are bright enough in color and continue the trend toward gaudiness that has been acceptable in this post-war period.

Some fear of the future may have an effect on the purchase of new cars and certainly the popularity of foreign cars is cutting down the demand for the larger, more powerful domestic brands. We note that men with two cars have one cheap-car that they drive most of the time and a big, pretty one for Sunday. Some two car men have a jeep or a pick-up for fishing, an old car or a little foreign one.

Americans car makers have gone in for gadgetry to such an extent that it may be overdone. Many drivers are able to do their own steering, roll their own windows and manage their own air conditioning. They do not care to become the captive of a car's automatic mechanism. Some simplification with some reduction in price may be next.

Can You Identify This Device?

CLUE: This device was patented in 1839 by a famous gunsmith. It is designed to minimize time and effort by doing two separate jobs.

ANSWER: This device was patented as the "Paterson" in 1839 by Samuel Colt. He designed it to facilitate loading the Colt revolver. One side of the charger introduced powder into the ammunition cylinder. The other side then added balls to the powder.

Postmaster Asks Care In Mailing

Postmaster Lloyd Johnson said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest single factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas. Post Office facilities have been expanded, extra help will be available, and everything is geared up to handle a record Christmas mail in Moro this year."

The postmaster suggests special care in preparing gift packages for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete when wrapping gifts for mailing. It is better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord.

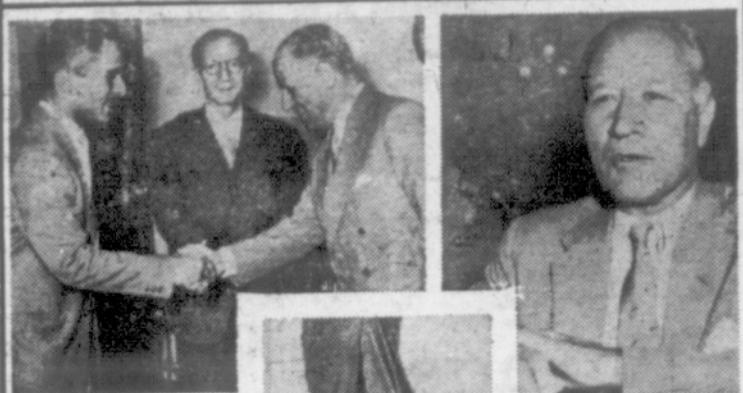
