Delivery of three of the largest transformers in the Pacific Power & Light system to the site of the company's 250,000-kilowatt Swift hydroelectric project powerhouse marks another milestone in the progress of the big development. Specially-built 34-wheeled truck-trailer, with both front and rear steering cabs, was needed to transport the 92 1/2-ton units, each rated at 87,000 kilovolt amperes capacity. Boom of towering crane, placing steel beams for powerhouse walls, will lift the 16-foot high transformers into position. Steel cylinder projecting from mountain, to left of crane-legs, is one of three 13-foot-diameter penstock tunnels which will drop water from reservoir behind world's highest earthfill dam to the huge turbine generators in the powerhouse. Power will begin flowing to customers late next year.
