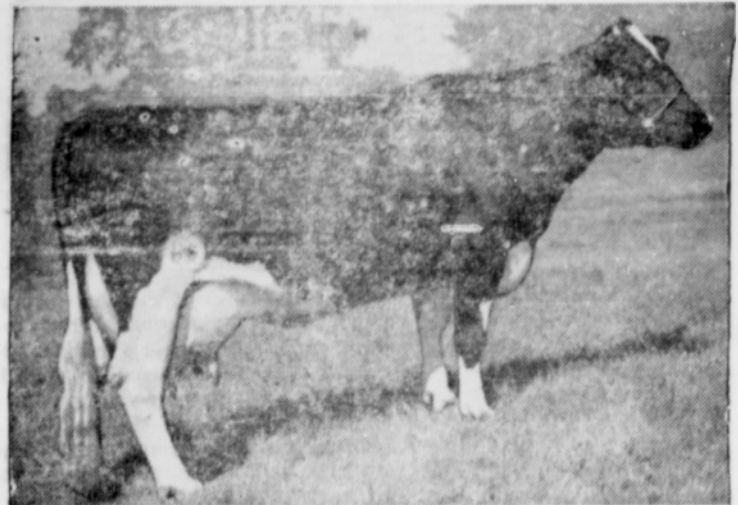


All Big Eaters

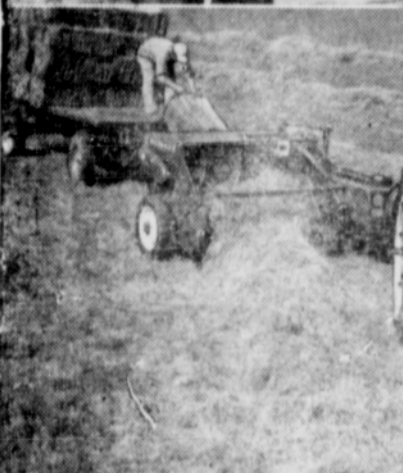
