Why does the Moro Library Board take pride in spending time and effort in developing the library? Bennett Cerf sums it up rather well in a recent Saturday Evening Post article entitled "Books Are Here To Stay". Mr. Cerf who is president of Random House publishing company, should know of which he speaks. TV is only the most recent diversion from reading. At the turn of the century it was the interurban trolley. Who would stay home to read when they could ride a trolley?

Next came the bicycle craze. Everybody on a bicycle and who would read books? And of course the automobile, motion pictures, radio and TV have followed. These have not hurt the sales of books according to Mr. Cerf. Census figures show an increase on sale of books of 75% from 1947 to 1954 and another 12% through 1957.

Mr. Cerf believes that TV and movies can stimulate the younger generation to more reading. After seeing science programs they will turn to books for more information. Today's programs based on history or from classical literature can cause youngsters to look for better reading material. He will not be as interested in shoot-em-up westerns after being able to watch all the "hoss-ops" he wants on TV. Thus better reading material is in demand.

Mr. Cerf reports 54 million juvenile books sold in 1947. In 1957 the total will be close to 270 million or an increase of 400%.

As long as youngsters learn to read, they will decide to read in latter years, regardless of other forms of entertainment. We on the library board believe this, and are happy to be able to offer as many fine books and as much pleasure reading as we have. Stop in and see if you don't find a book you'll enjoy.
