Books Coming Too Fast For Bookworm

Some new books are going on the Moro Library shelves this week. They are really coming faster than the "Bookworm" can digest them. You'll have to stop in to see the entire list.

Two of the new ones are non-fiction again. Stewart Holbrook's "Dreamers of the American Dream" is included. These are more than merely stories of American history's off-beat characters, these are the stories woven together into a single narration of the heroes and heroines of the temperance and suffrage movement, of the persons who worked for the deaf and dumb, the insane and the blind—or brought about prison reforms, or led the fight for the workman. The story of Sylvester Graham, who campaigned against "unadulterated" bread but only succeeded in having a cracker named after him. Adult non-fiction readers will enjoy this book.

The high school non-fiction readers will enjoy "Young Men So Daring" by Vera Kelsey. These adventure stories actually happened to four young fur traders, explorers in the Oregon Territory. John Jacob Astor was one of the young men, who with the dream of winning the West for the United States established Astoria at the mouth of the Columbia river.

Another of the books is a collection of stories entitled "Horses, Horses, Horses" by Phyllis Fenner. Practically all young people, and many older ones, too, are "crazy over horses, horses, horses," as the old song goes. Here are 18 good horse stories. Some about racing horses and one about a plough horse. These stories should appeal to all ages because the love of horses is universal and ageless.

ACREAGE DOWN

Oregon farmers intend to plant about 5 per cent fewer acres this spring than a year ago, according to Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

Studying results of a questionnaire sent recently to the nation's farmers by the USDA crop reporting service, Mrs. Horrell found that Oregon growers plan to seed 18 percent fewer acres of spring wheat this year than in 1957. More acres were planted to winter wheat last fall, however, and this would still mean 8 per cent more land in wheat this year, she said.

The state's farmers also indicated they expect to plant 7 per cent fewer acres of oats than last spring, 3 per cent less barley, 2 per cent less sugar beets, and expect to harvest 3 percent fewer acres of hay. On the other side of the ledger, Oregon farmers said they intend to up their usually small corn acreages by 11 per cent, and increase fall potato acreages by 4 per cent. Acreages of dry field peas will be about the same as last year, it was reported.

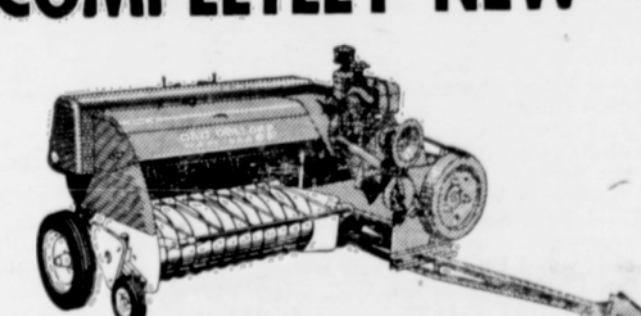
