The base of the Sherman County Rural School District is not large enough to meet the cost of the "Estimated Local Tax Levies for Operational purposes" (Offset to the elementary districts and to the county high school district) as computed according to formula prescribed by law.

The amount of tax, in excess of the six per cent limitation proposed to be levied by the rural school district of Sherman County, Oregon, for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1958, is \$79,250.59.

County Budget Up From 1957; Election Called

The county budget committee argued long and at some times heatedly last Thursday and turned in figures that will cost the taxpayers \$238,670.00 if approved by the voters at an election to be held May 16, along with the primary election. The last year's budget was for \$230,403.00.

The budget for the general fund is up \$10,000 and for roads is down \$1,750.

Causes of the increases are mostly salaries and new items added to the list of county expenditures. The new planning commission will get \$2500 which it may or may not spend. There is an item of \$500 to publish the planning conference report and there is whopping increase in the estimate for county audit. Officials were discontented with former auditor Charles Logan who charged \$1500 and hired the state which is apparently going to cost \$5000. The emergency fund was boosted to \$12,000 from \$5000.

Salaries Cause Debate

Salaries of sheriff, clerk and assessor were raised to \$4500 and these items caused most of the argument. Officers had asked for \$5040 (\$5000 in case of the clerk) and finally were marked down to \$4500. Deputy clerk will get \$2000, deputy sheriff remains at \$3600 and deputy assessor was cut to \$1000 from \$2400. The treasurer and judge will get \$2250 if the estimates are approved by the voters.

A small saving was made in the welfare budget which went in at \$5800 instead of \$6263 last year. Justice Galloway will get \$1980 instead of \$1800 and the county agent's office \$7390 instead of \$6800.

Outside of that the county budget will look familiar to those used to reading that figure-filled document.

Road fund expenditures will be almost the same as before except that some of the money for new road machinery will be put into a sinking fund for replacement of used machinery. The total figure remains at \$12,500. Wages remain at \$57,000. Some savings will be made in drill steel and grader blades and on tires and tubes. Nothing spectacular in the road budget.
