Farm Prices Up As Meat Climbs

Oregon farm prices zoomed upward nearly six per cent last month to chalk up the sharpest monthly percentage increase in the state in nearly 15 years, according to Mrs. Elvera Horrell, extension agricultural economist at Oregon State college.

At the same time, average farm prices across the nation went up 4 per cent for the biggest monthly jump in about seven years. Farm prices in Oregon now top those of a year ago by 4 per cent, Mrs. Horrell said, while the national increase adds up to 11 per cent over the past year.

Both Oregon and national farm prices now stand at the highest average levels in nearly 5 years.

Meat animals and potatoes led the price rise in Oregon, Mrs. Horrell found in examining reports from the U. S. department of agriculture. Higher prices for meat animals, poultry, and eggs more than offset lower price tags on dairy products, wool and mohair. Oregon's crops also scored an upturn in March as rises in hay, potatoes, and fresh market vegetables more than compensated for lower prices on wheat, feed grains, fruits, nuts, berries and seeds.

Prices of things farmers buy also continued up, but at a slower pace than prices received by farmers. The parity index—the government's measure of the trend of farm costs—increased less than 1 per cent during March to another all-time high.

But with prices received by farmers advancing faster than prices of things farmers buy, farm product purchasing power took another turn for the better, Mrs. Horrell said. The parity—the government's yardstick for measuring national prices in relation to farm costs—stood at 87 in mid-March, up 4 points for the month and 6 points better than a year ago.

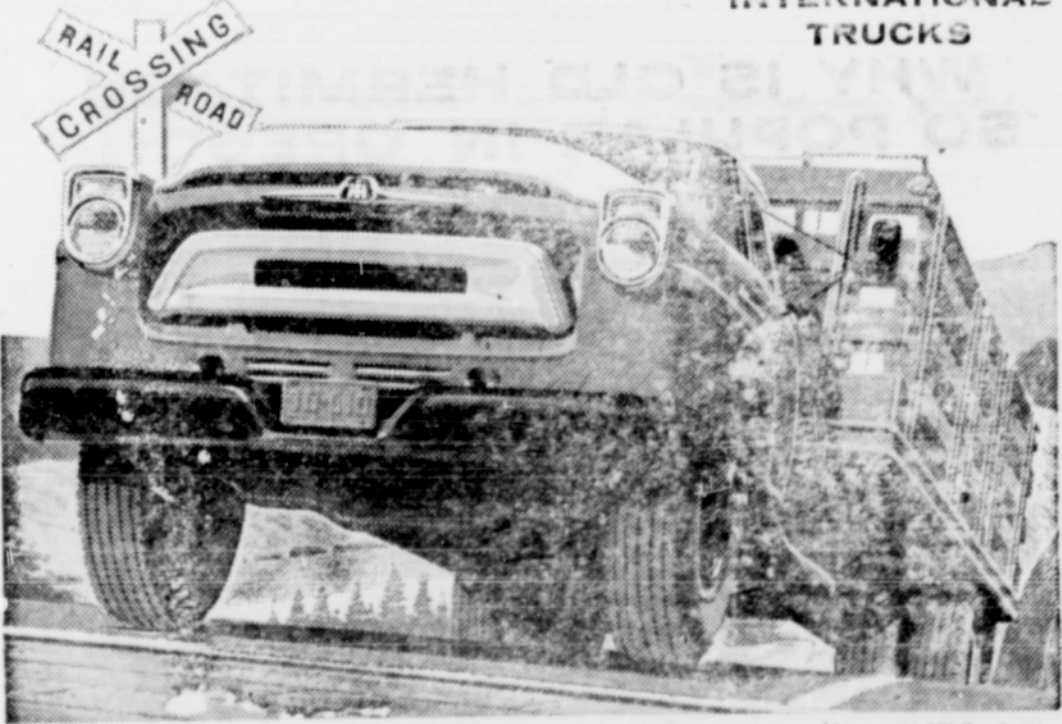
