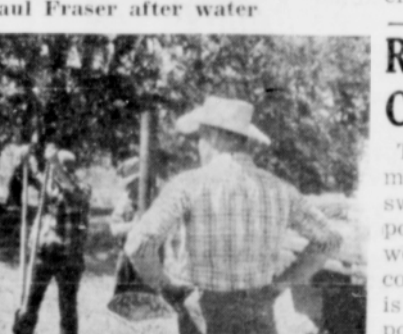

Teacher Explains Methods of FFA

The supervised farming program carried on by members of the Sherman FFA chapter show the growth of the group during its first year. The 31 chapter members own 77 beef animals, 40 hogs, and 140 hens. The chapter has a slow start in crops with 50 acres of barley and 55 acres of wheat.

The size of the farming programs are commendable considering all members are in their first year of FFA.

The supervised farming program make agriculture a vocational course. Each boy has something at home to which classroom work can be applied. Each boy has a personal interest in the work because it involves something that is "his".

The farming program also makes the course vocational by providing the boy with part of a farm. Upon graduation the boy has not only the knowledge to farm, but also the beginnings of a beef herd, a wheat ranch, a hog enterprise. These make the big step into farming much easier.

Two facts are apparent. The boy with the biggest farming program learns from more experience.

Secondly, the bigger the farming program, the closer the boy to farming.

Election Follows Star Trend; Budget Beaten

A little more than 70 percent of the Republicans and a little less than 60 percent of the Democrats went to the polls Friday and cast ballots for governor and candidates for other offices. There were 453 Republican voters and 343 Democrats.

On the Republican side Marion Weatherford, unopposed for congress, got 379. Eichman had 17, Gill 7, Hatfield 182, Livingston 10, Raser 2 and Unander 175. McCauley was nominated for labor commissioner without opposition and Orville Cutsforth for the legislature unopposed with 347 votes.

On the state ticket for the Democrats Holmes had 174, Smith 51 and Wallace 118. Al Ullman for congress had 308 Nilson had no opposition for labor commissioner nor Frank Weatherford for the legislature who got 309 votes.

Overhulse, Madras attorney, carried the county with 358 to 322 for the winning Sloan. Judge Rossman won over Jason Lee 437 to 278.

The Call of the Churches issued by the Board of Managers of Church World Service on Feb. 6, 1958:

"In view of the urgent need for clothing among the disaster-stricken, chronically destitute, and homeless refugees of our time, and in accordance with the request of the Churches... the Board of Managers of Church World Service, in response, hereby issues a Call to the Churches to secure 50,000,000 pounds of clothing during the next four years, with an immediate goal of a minimum of ten million pounds during 1958."

This is a united Church appeal. It is not denominational any and all may contribute. There is also a need of gifts of money to get the clothing from the distributing centers to the port.

The things most needed are men's clothing, especially trousers, suits and work clothing. Teenagers clothing for both boys and girls, children's garments, infants wear, women's clothing—blankets and bedding.
