The minister of the Wasco Methodist church will assume a new appointment in Anchorage, Alaska, effective, June 22, 1958.

The Rev. Richard E. Bruner and family have accepted an appointment to build a new Methodist church, in a fast growing suburb of Anchorage called Turnagain-By-The-Sea. The Methodist Board of Missions, own approximately four acres of land in a choice location in this residential area. Rev. Bruner will be surveying the community, organizers and begin plans for building a church school, organizing the first group of charter members and begin plans for building a new Methodist church in the fall.

During the summer months Rev. Bruner will also be serving the Anchor Park Methodist church in Anchorage, until its minister returns from a summer leave in the United States. The Bruners will reside at 2605 Lake Otis Road, Anchorage Alaska during the summer months. Early in the fall they will move into their permanent parsonage in Turnagain-By-The-Sea.

The work in Alaska is directed by The National Board of Missions of The Methodist church, New York City. The Bruners will be commissioned as Missionaries to the Alaska Mission at this session of the Oregon annual conference, June 16-20, by Bishop A. Raymond Grant at Portland. The Bruners are due to fly from Portland to Anchorage on or about June 20.

Before entering this new work they left for Ohio by train May 26, to visit for two weeks with their parents who reside in Columbus and Cincinnati. They will be back in Wasco for their last Sunday June 15.

Rural Life Sunday was observed in the Wasco Methodist church May 18 with special services, which included a service of Dedication of Seed and Soil and Soul. Presenting the seed for dedication at the altar was Paulen Kaseberg, president of Oregon Wheat Commission and winner of the Sherman county conservation award in 1956; presenting the soil for dedication was Kenneth Fridley, a state commissioner of Highways of Oregon and member of The Dalles Port Commission, who was also the 1958 winner of the Sherman county conservation award. The Rev. Bruner delivered a sermon on "The Lord's Acre" in reference to man's responsibility to be good stewards of the soil and thus work in partnership with God in whose Hands belong all the earth, man, and his possessions.

In acceptance Rev. Bruner thanked the members and friends for their loyalty to the program and their spirit of good cooperation. He recounted many of the outstanding achievements that had been made in the past four years and wished the church continued success under new leadership.
